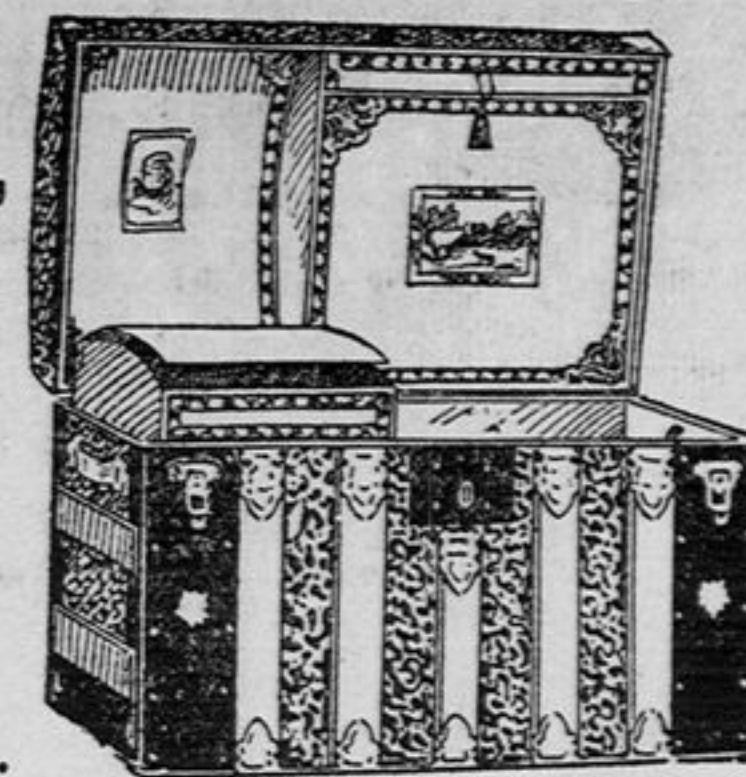

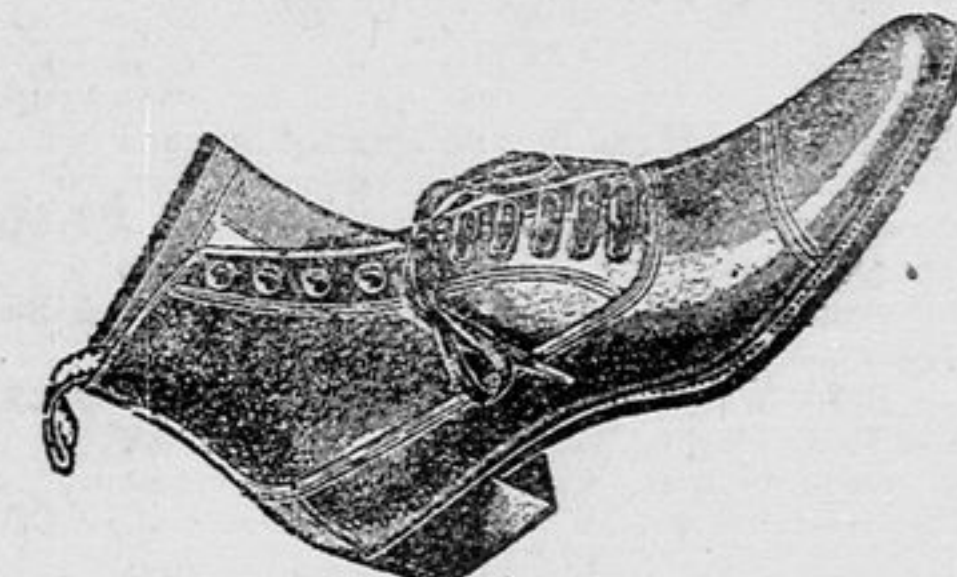

Canadians at the Cape.

The following telegram was received yesterday afternoon: CAPE TOWN, Nov. 28th. "The Allan liner Sardinian from Montreal with the Canadian contingent, one thousand strong, has arrived here, all well." This puts our men on the ground while 20,000 British troops are still upon the sea. The New South Wales Lancers have already been in action and our fellows will shortly be under the deadly fire of the Boers.
