SIR CHARLES TUPPER AND THE NEXT LEADER

The Aged Leader has Resigned. Who Shall Succeed Him?

Following hard upon the election returns, came the announcement that Sir Charles Tupper would resign the Conservative leadership and retire from political life. At his age such a decision is no wonder. The defeat of his party and his own rejection at Cape Breton, likely reinforced his age in indicating the course Sir Charles has decided upon. Apart from party considerations altogether, one could have wished that it had been given him to cross the political bar with clouds lowering less heavily. Defeat is always pathetic and when it comes in the last battle it is especially so. Youth may retrieve its fortunes, but age cannot. Because of his long and distinguished service to Canada, his venerable years and the record of our treatment of men who give themselves to public life, most people would have gladly seen Sir Charles retire under more favorable circumstances. But fate decreed otherwise. It has no appreciation of the fitness of things.

Biographical

Sir Charles Tupper was born at Amherst, Nova Scotia, July 2nd 1821. So he was 79 years old last July. His father was Rev. Charles Tupper, D.D., a minister of the Anglican church.

At the age of 22 he graduated in medicine at Edinburgh, Scotland, and became a member of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons. Returning to his native land he practised his profession. In 1855 he defeated the famous Joseph Howe leader of the Nova Scotia Liberals. Next year he was provincial secretary and in 1864 became premier of the province. Then the question of unions among the eastern provinces and later of the western as well, arose. Sir Charles did heroic work till confederation was accomplished.

For his services he was knighted and in 1870 became a member of the British Privy Council. He was Sir John Macdonald's adviser after the defeat of '74 and held the portfolio of Public Works at Sir John's return in 1878. He was the first Minister of Railways and Canals. In 1884 Sir Charles went to England as Canadian High Commissioner. Three years later he entered the Macdonald cabinet as Minister of Finance. In 1888 he again went to London as Commissioner. In the same year he was made a baronet. In 1896 Sir Charles came to Canada and succeeded Sir Mackenzie Bowell as premier of the party in the election of that year is fresh in the memories of all.

During his long political career he was never defeated in a constituency until the people of Cape Breton rejected him on the 7th. One of his greatest achievements was winning free schools for Nova Scotia. That was early in his life, but every great movement in Canada's history has borne the impress of his genius. Confederation, the C. P. R., the National Policy, our Imperial relations have all been brought about under a large measure of his direction. He is worthy of the tribute paid him by the gathering of Conservatives in Montreal on Monday, when their resolution said:

"We recognize that the life of Sir Charles Tupper has been entirely consecrated to his country; he was one of the fathers of the Canadian confederation, during the whole of his career his policy has had for its object the assurance of equal justice to all, and in this hour of defeat he is entitled to the respect of all."

Sir Charles is still vigorous in mind and body. His labors in the late campaign have been an astonishment. From Nova Scotia he hurried westward for British Columbia the day after the elections and will be in the fight for his party in the elections yet to be held out there. But he is old. He cannot live many years. Like Gladstone in his vigor during a final political fight, years must soon bid him like Gladstone yield to them. In the meantime may his life be calm and the skies above him clear. The Montreal Star says:

His graceful adieu to his old friends and the country he has loved and laboured for is regretted, but he has earned, as few other men ever did, the right to spend his remaining years in the peace and quietness of domestic life. He takes with him the best wishes, the kindest feelings, the most cordial sentiment of the whole Conservative party, and we feel sure of many outside of its ranks who recognize the noble work of the great man's life.

The New Leader

The Conservative party is faced with the task of selecting a new leader. It will likely prove one of the most difficult of all its numerous tasks. It would not be hard to name a man whom the rank and file would be glad to follow or who deserves the honors of leadership. But there are other things to be considered and more important. The party needs a man who can lead it to victory. Its motive for staying in existence is to make its policy prevail in the affairs of Canada. To do that it must come into power. It is no harm for a party to pick a leader with a view to winning elections.

No name has yet been mentioned that rouses much hope along that line. Mr. Foster, Clarke Wallace, E. F. Clarke, Mr. Casgrain and others have been mentioned but none of them have seemed to strike the party as being particularly fitted for the position of leadership at the present time.

It may be that the new leader will be a Frenchman. There strategical reasons why he should be. That he need not necessarily be an Ontario man is well put by the Mail and Empire when it says:

"Assuming that Sir Charles cannot be urged to return to the great labour he took up and prosecuted with such gallantry and courage, the question of the national leadership arises. This is a matter upon which no hurried decision need be given. As a matter of fact the party leader is the parliamentary leader, and the choice, although it must be influenced by the feeling outside of the house, will be made according to our usage by the members in parliament whom that leader is to lead. Of material there will be no lack. The Liberal-Conservatives will have in the new house many great, able, and

eloquent men, and there can be a choice around which the party and the country will certainly rally. The province of Ontario, it is true, furnishes to the parliamentary party the great body of its strength. It might claim if numbers alone were to rule, the right to dictate whom the leader should be. But such a claim would be a violation of the broad and national spirit which prevades the Liberal-Conservative party. It would overlook the fact that it is the party of the whole country, and not the party of a province or of a section, Ontario members, we may be sure, are ready to assume the responsibility that may be laid upon the shoulders of any of their number; but we are equally certain that they will be governed by no provincial ideas, and they will follow a national leader of ability and honour, and of patriotism, no matter from what part of the Dominion he comes. The Liberal-Conservative party has always been a unifying agency in the country. It has brought people together for national purposes, and has thus made for the solidity and the progress of Canada. From its national role it must never depart."

A general meeting will likely be held soon and the question of leadership fully discussed along with the general policy of the Conservative party.
