Obituary Eliza Baldwin. Mrs. Eliza Baldwin who died on Monday at the age of 84 years was born in Fernagh, Ireland, and came to Quebec when only seven years old. At the age of 17 she was married to her late husband Mr. Thos. Baldwin. They resided in Hamilton till 1861 when they came to Lindsay. Two sons and two daughters, 27 grandchildren and 41 great-grandchildren survive her. Mrs. Baldwin was a member of the church of England. She was buried at Riverside on Tuesday.

John Daniel Mr. John Daniel one of the old settlers of Fenelon died on Thursday the 7th inst. Mr. Daniel was born in Kilkenny county, Ireland, 69 years ago. In early life he came to this county and has been closely identified with the interests, agricultural and municipality of Fenelon for many years. Formerly he lived on the shore of Balsam Lake but later moved to lot 29, corner of the township, where he died. Mr. Daniel was a member of the local council for 24 years and for most of that time reeve of the township and in that capacity sat in the county council as it was formerly constituted. Mr. Daniel was stalwart alike in physique and character, a man of intelligence and conviction, esteemed for integrity and candor. He was a member of the Church of England and a Conservative. The funeral was conducted by Rev. W. Farncombe Fenelon Falls, on Saturday when the remains were interred at the village cemetery. It was largely attended.
