AMONG THE CHURCHES
Echoes From Sunday's Services—Rev. A. J. H. Strike Preached a Temperance Sermon

—On Sunday morning Rev. L. S. Hughson B.D. preached on "Conduct, Character and Conscience." His text was: "Only let your conversation be such as becometh the gospel of Christ." Phil. 1: 27.
—The pastor, Rev. G. W. Henderson, preached morning and night at the Cambridge-st Methodist church. After the morning service the Lord's Supper was dispensed, and after the night service the love feast was conducted.

ST. ANDREW'S
At St. Andrew's Rev. J. W. Macmillan B. A. preached on "Enquiries After Christ." These were divided into three classes which were illustrated by the Scribes and Pharisees who sought Christ to ask him catch questions, Nicodemus and the rich young man, and Christ's disciples. To the first class Christ answered indirectly and revealed their hypocrisy; the second he treated with much sympathy and consideration, for they were sincere. To the third class he spoke in direct and confidential terms. The sermon was one of the series to young people and upon these the preacher pressed the necessity for earnest, early inquiry after Christ.

QUEEN-ST METHODIST
At the Queen-st Methodist church, Rev. A. J. H. Strike preached a temperance sermon. His text was the famous exhortation of Solomon: "Look not upon the wine when it is red; when it moveth itself aright, when it giveth its color in the cup, for at last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder."
Some men, said the preacher, watched a pile of rubbish that moved as though concealing some live thing. Buried beneath it was a boa constrictor that two years before had escaped from a menagerie that had wintered in that town. The serpent at that time had been 12 feet long and 35 pounds in weight, but when discovered was 19 feet long, weighed 68 pounds and had eight young constrictors, one of which killed a dog, that essayed the capture of the serpent family.
This incident was made to illustrate how the drinking habit grows on a man. If he always remained as much its master as when he began there would be little danger; but he does not; from being a pet, it becomes a terrible monster.

"There is one thing that disqualifies our great nation," said Mr. Strike, "from being the world's leader in all things transcendent; it is protected by parliament, shielded by the law, often lauded by the press and flattered by society. It is the liquor traffic. As a nation we are doing much to civilize the world; but while we are proud of our flag and liberty and religion, we must hang our heads because of the ruin that follows our advent in dark places of the world. The missionary with Bible in one hand and brandy bottle in the other. By our preachers we bring the heathen face to face with Christ and the cross, by our canten we bring them face to face with hell itself."

In England the consumption of liquor was said to be increasing in spite of all that was being done to check its mad career. The majority of ministers and church members were total abstainers. These were supplemented by the medical men who declare against liquor. They say it is not a food but a poison. Dr. Andrew Clarke of England said that the diseases of seven out of 10 hospital patients arose from liquor. Dr. J. Adams of London after 40 years' experience in hospitals asks in vain for one instance in which a member of a family indulged in alcoholic drinks and every other member was not hurt or ruined by it. Dr. Richardson says that in England was sober the people would live a third longer. The insurance companies agree that liquor shortens the average length of life.

The judges declare that drink makes crime. Justice Hawkins says most crimes are engendered in the public houses.
Gadstone said drink caused greater calamity than war, famine and pestilence. Chamberlain said drinking is the curse of England, and that if he could destroy the desire for liquor, the jails and workhouses would soon be empty, and more lives saved each year than would be cut off by a bitter savage war. Sir Oliver Morat said that three-fourths of all misery, insanity and crime are caused by liquor. These are great witnesses, and if what they say are true we should rise and destroy the liquor traffic.

It is said that stopping the traffic would throw men out of employment. The fact is that for the amount of money invested in the liquor traffic gives employment to few men. The Dublin brewery with a capital of £14,000,000 employs 3000 hands, the Belfast linen works with the same capital employ 100,000 hands. The Caledonian distillery with 1 1/2 millions capital employs 150 men, the Sheffield Atlas Works with the same capital has 45000 employees. England uses annually 1200 million bushels of grain to degrade and pauperize its people.

A man sat under a tree. He seemed dejected. Another man said to him: "You look like a mechanic."
"I am."
"You seem in hard luck."
"I am," replied he.
"Do you use liquor?"
"Not very much; for 60 years I have taken three pints of ale per day."
"Well," said his questioner, "that has cost you £3226 or a sum that would yield you £150 a year income. You would have been just as healthy and far richer if you had not drunk ale during the past 60 years."
Christ came to the 19th century as the emancipator of the slaves, for whom Clarkson, Wilberforce, Garretson, Phillips and Lincoln pled. He will come to the 20th century as the conqueror of the drink traffic, a

traffic as dark as slavery and far more difficult to overthrow.
"I am so glad that, locally, politics have been buried as far as the coming Referendum vote is concerned. It was born in a Conservative gathering and adopted in a Liberal gathering. It is not a question of Ross or Whitney, but a question as to whether you will protect your boys and girls. Fathers, even if you love liquor, vote against it and give your boys and mine a chance. While a father dozed in a park his little son wandered away and fell over a precipice. Wake up, fathers! Your children are wandering on the verge. A minister was defending the manliness that did not need to take the pledge. An old man got up and told how his son had heard a similar address and now filled a drunkard's grave. It does not do to be too manly along some of these lines," said Mr. Strike.

The preacher declared that he was not talking against the hotels but against the liquor. No matter what it meant to a man's business or his chances of becoming an M. P. he should vote against the liquor. A strange report had come from Mariposa to the effect that recently Mr. Strike had asked those of his morning congregation who favored prohibition to stand up and only two or three had risen. "You know," said Mr. Strike, "that there was a good congregation here that morning and that nearly everybody stood up. I want that to be known in Mariposa." In response to another request that all rise who favored prohibition, practically the whole audience stood and at the pastor's bidding, sang the doxology. After the morning service the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered.

THE SIFTON TRIAL.
Gerald Sifton Again Arraigned at London For the Murder of His Father—Court Grants Crown's Request.

London, Nov. 4.—In the presence of a large crowd Gerald Sifton yesterday afternoon began his third fight for life. Many women were present, and the greatest interest was manifested in the man charged with deliberately beating his father to death in a fit of rage. Judge Britton showed a disposition to hurry the case, and a jury was secured after 33 men had been called. Much progress was made in spite of the fact that an adjournment was taken at 5 o'clock. The following are the jurymen: J. E. Thomas, Douglas Galloway, F. A. Ryan, Henry Rismele, W. J. Howlett, David Wood, George I. Stephenson, Robert Patterson, William Sturges, Andrew Gardiner, William Ellwood, S. K. McRae.

This is a special term called for the purpose of disposing of this case. The first mild clash came the moment the jury was sworn. The Crown representations desired to have an adjournment for the purpose of permitting the jury to visit the scene of the tragedy. The defense opposed the suggestion on the ground that the scene had changed much in two years and would not present the appearance that it did the day of the accident or murder. The court ordered the trial to proceed, and he would decide the motion later.

R. C. Clute, K.C., opened the case for the Crown. He reviewed the facts briefly and maintained that the Crown could establish a case of murder—a crime based upon Gerald Sifton's fear that his father was about to marry Mary McFarland, his servant, who would inherit the elder Sifton's property instead of Gerald. He went over the horrible details touching the sickening tragedy in which the old farmer lost his life, and concluded by explaining that the case was one both of circumstantial evidence and confession of one of the murderers.

The defense made no statement outlining the case.
Architect Melbride, who drew plans for the scene of the murder, identified same. He was on the stand two hours explaining the dimensions of the barn in which Joseph Sifton met his death.

The trial previously required ten days. This time it is expected to consume seven days, or less.
The Crown has subpoenaed 51 witnesses, and the defence half as many. The two previous trials cost this County \$10,000 each. The present hearing will add another \$10,000 to the bill.

The jury will visit the scene of the crime the first thing this morning.

Township of Bexley
BY-LAW NO. 357.

A BY-LAW TO GRANT EXEMPTION FROM TAXATION, EXCEPT SCHOOL TAXES, TO THE RAVEN LAKE PORTLAND CEMENT COMPANY, LIMITED.

WHEREAS the Raven Lake Portland Cement Company, Limited, have proposed to establish Manufacturing Works at or near Raven Lake in the Township of Bexley, for the manufacture of Portland Cement and its products and building supplies generally, provided that the said Company is granted exemption from general taxation, and in the public interest of the said township to grant the said exemption and secure the erection of the said works in the said township.

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Bexley, enacts as follows:
1. Provided that the said Raven Lake Portland Cement Company, Limited, shall with all convenient speed proceed with and erect works for the manufacture of Portland Cement in the Township of Bexley, operations for the building of such works to be commenced within six months from the date this by-law comes into effect, and said works to be ready for manufacturing operations within two years from the said date, and provided that the said Company shall keep the said works in operation for at least six months in each year, in consideration thereof the said company is hereby granted exemption from taxation, except taxes for School purposes, as to all the real estate and personal property of the said company used in connection with and for the purposes of their said manufacturing business, (and not to cover or exempt dwelling properties of any kind) and as to all the income of the said Company. Such exemption is to extend for a period of ten years from the date of coming into effect of this by-law.

2. PROVIDED that if in any year after the completion of the said works, the said works are not kept in operation for a period of six months, then the said Company shall pay a proportion of such year's taxes corresponding to such time as the said works are closed down over, but this clause shall not apply to such periods of time as the said works shall be shut down for the purpose of necessary repairs thereto, or for the putting in of new machinery or the rebuilding of the said works if destroyed or partly destroyed by fire.

DEER HUNTER'S CLOSE CALL

He was Trampled by a Wounded Buck
An Ottawa despatch says: Arthur Gravelle, a French Indian, who has been on the Gattineau on a hunting trip, arrived home in a rather battered condition. His face was cut and his arms broken as a result of an attack of a big buck, which succeeded in wounding, but did not kill outright.

Gravelle says he had been on the run-way from early morning until late in the afternoon, when he saw the buck coming along at a leisurely gate. He took aim and fired, and much to his delight, the buck came down. He hurried over to where it was, and proceeded to bleed the animal. Just as he stuck his knife through its throat the animal jumped to its feet and threw him about ten feet away. Then it reared and drove its forefeet down upon him. Fortunately they landed on either side of his body, but one hoof struck his left arm above the elbow and splintered the bone. The buck made another attempt to trample him with its hoofs, but fell over as it reared, and went down and out from loss of blood.
Gravelle lay where he was for an hour or more in a stupor. After that he does not remember anything until he found his friends pouring some brandy into his mouth.

—On Wednesday of last week, Mr. Wm. J. Locke, for fifty-six years a farmer in the Township of Yarmouth just east of St. Thomas, was killed. A cow with only one horn had calved during the afternoon, and Mr. Locke had left the calf in front of the cow while his wife was milking her. The cow attacked Mr. Locke, piercing him above the heart with her horn, severing the main artery, and he died instantly. Deceased was born in Somerset, Eng., and was 74 years of age. He leaves, besides his wife, three sons and two daughters. He was one of the most prosperous farmers and cattle dealers in Elgin County.
