MORPHINE AND MURDER.

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HAVE ENTERED MANITOBA.

The Main Body of the Marching Doughboys at Binscath.

Binscath, Man., Nov. 4.—At 10 o'clock yesterday morning the Doughboy wanderers were resting quietly one mile west of this point. They still keep up their custom of praying and chanting. They have no hesitation in accepting charity. In fact they are begging as they go along. Many were observed from the train picking over the stubble in search for stray ears of wheat. Last night was spent by the pilgrims a few miles east of Millwood. As they proceed they are becoming communicative, and are certainly bound for Winnipeg. Four mounted policemen are following closely in the rear.

To-day the women and children will be shipped on a special train of colonist coaches home from Yorkton to Swan River, thence to their villages. Agent Harley will accompany them. There may be some trouble in entraining them.

There was a very heavy snowfall throughout Manitoba last night, the first of the season. The snow will probably solve the Doughboy problem, as the marching enthusiasts have predicted all along that any and bright weather would prevail until they reached Winnipeg.

TWO MEN SENTENCED.

Latest Scandal in England Hits Those Prominent in Society.

London, Nov. 4.—The excitement Sunday over the reported flight of a peer to the Continent was heightened yesterday by the announcement that a well-known London society man, Bernard Fraser, had been sentenced at the Norwich assizes, to ten years penal servitude. With him was also sentenced Arthur Thorold, the son of a clergyman, connected, as is Fraser, with one of the oldest and proudest families in the United Kingdom. The prisoners were charged with having carried on a regular practice to deprave the morals of youths all over the country. An array of prominent King's councillors appeared on both sides, but the prisoners pleaded guilty of misdemeanors, apparently with the idea of getting off with light sentences.

Sir Sanford Congratulated.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—Sir Sanford Fleming received a cablegram from the Earl of Jersey, who presided over the colonial conference in Ottawa in 1894, extending hearty congratulations upon the completion of the Pacific cable.

NO APPOINTMENT YET

No Announcement of a Successor to Hon. Mr. Tarte.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER SILENT.

Hon. James Sutherland May Take the Portfolio of Public Works—Mr. Raymond Prefontaine May Be Sworn of the Privy Council as Minister of Marine and Fisheries—New Clerk of the House.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—The Premier has not as yet given any intimation as to who is to be the new Cabinet Minister. When asked yesterday morning if he had any statement to give to the press, Sir Wilfrid replied in the negative. It would surprise no one, however, if Hon. James Sutherland were made Minister of Public Works, and Mr. Raymond Prefontaine, M.P., sworn of the Privy Council as Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

May Go to the Bench.

Mr. Brodeur, it would seem, does not want a place in the Cabinet. He prefers to remain Speaker of the House, for the present, at any rate, with the prospect ultimately of a position upon the bench. That Mr. Brodeur makes an ideal Speaker, all will admit. A high authority said this morning that the present Speaker was the best we had ever had in Canada. He is dignified, impartial and resolute, with a sweetness of temper which renders him irresistible. Of personal magnetism he has an abundance, and he is deservedly popular with both sides of the House. If it be true that Mr. Brodeur has no aspirations for the Cabinet, the Government will lose, and the House of Commons will gain.

New Clerk of the House.

Mr. Brodeur's decision to remain Speaker, if he has so decided, is a fortunate occurrence, in view of the fact that the clerkship of the House is vacant, and an appointment will soon have to be made. With a Speaker and a clerk, both new to their duties, the coming session of Parliament might have witnessed some awkward blunders. With Mr. Brodeur still in the chair, Mr. Flint, member for Yarmouth, N. S., who is to succeed the late Sir John Bourn as clerk of the House, will have a comparatively easy job before him. The intention is to considerably enlarge the scope of the Marine and Fisheries Department, when Mr. Prefontaine takes hold, so that it will be nearly as important as Public Works.

BRITISH OUTPOST RAIDED.

Remoted That Mad Mullah Moves Again—Britons Advance Nov. 27.

Aden, Arabia, Nov. 4.—It is rumored in native quarters that the Mullah has raided an advance British outpost, in the vicinity of Bohote, Somaliland, capturing a large camel transport.

Col. Swayne has been recalled to England temporarily, where he will act as adviser to the Foreign Office. Gen. Manning has assumed command of the British Somaliland expedition. Three thousand men will begin to advance against the Mullah about Nov. 27. This delay is due to the fact that Gen. Manning is dispensing with the Indian troops in the belief that the native levies are more effective.

Nova Scotia Women Killed.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 4.—Miss Clara Morton, the laundress, employed at the McLean Asylum, who was assaulted on the grounds of the institution Saturday evening by an unknown person, is dead, and the police have no satisfactory clew by which to trace her assailant. She was unconscious from the time of the attack till she died. Miss Morton came from Nova Scotia, and had been employed at the hospital for three years.

Under the Charlton Act.

Windsor, Nov. 4.—At noon yesterday David Valandry was convicted before Judge Howe of having committed an offence under the Charlton Act, the victim being a little 8-year-old daughter of a Sandwich South farmer. Valandry was sentenced to ten years in Kingston penitentiary and to receive twenty-four lashes, twelve in two months from date and twelve in a year from that time. Valandry took his sentence stoically.

Sale of U. S. Lands.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 4.—The annual report of Commissioner of the General Land Office, shows that the public land disposed of by the Government during the year aggregated \$19,438,595 acres, an increase of 3,925,739 acres over the previous year.

Hit With Buckshot.

Kingston, Nov. 4.—While Abraham Potter, this city, was out shooting with his brother-in-law, William Connolly of Pittsburg Township, the gun was accidentally discharged, one of the buckshots lodging in his eye and several more in his chest.

Teacher Murdered.

Manila, Nov. 4.—D. C. Montgomery, Superintendent of Schools in Oriental Negros, was murdered Friday by Ladrones. This is the first instance of a teacher in the Philippine Islands being harmed while in discharge of his duties.

Accept Carnegie's Gift.

Montreal, Que., Nov. 4.—The Montreal City Council unreservedly accepted yesterday Mr. Carnegie's offer of \$150,000 for a free library, it being decided to consider the question of books later on.

Toistol Ill Again.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 4.—The Novosot says that Count Toistol is suffering from another attack of inflammation of the lungs.

Wireless Preferred to Cable. Sydney, N. S., Nov. 4.—The Dominion Government cable steamer Tyrrian left this port yesterday morning to lay a cable from Great Inle to Bryan Island, a distance of ten miles, and from Bryan Island to Anticosti, a distance of 110 miles. Government Engineer Keeley, who installed the wireless telegraphy station at Belle Isle, will have charge of laying the cable. He said yesterday that the Dominion Government's wireless station at Belle Isle was working perfectly and the system was so easy of operation that the operators used it in preference to the cable, which also connected the points linked by the Marconi system. "I expect," said Mr. Keeley, "that all Government stations in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, thirty-five in number, will soon be equipped with the wireless telegraph system."

To Study River Bed.

Niagara Falls, Nov. 4.—Two Berlin scientists, Prof. Herman G. Stokes and Adolph Mitski, accompanied by two New York scientists, have arrived at Niagara Falls, to study that portion of the Niagara River bed which, owing to the operations of the Canadian Power Company, is at present dry.

Another Paper For Windsor.

Windsor, Nov. 4.—Charles Baker, city editor of the Windsor Record, has resigned to engage in a job printing business, in partnership with Joseph McKee. It is also Mr. Baker's intention to edit a weekly Conservative paper, the first issue of which will appear in three weeks.

Pigeons Long Fly.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—Charles Gallagher has a pair of pigeons, six months old, that flew 700 miles.
