More Money to Beer Burglers.

London, Nov. 5.—A civil service estimate has been issued placing the additional amount required as a grant to aid the Transvaal and Orange River Colony during the present financial year at \$40,000,000. The sum of \$15,000,000 is to be devoted to grants to Burglars, \$10,000,000 to British sufferers by the war, and \$15,000,000 is to be used for loans promised by the terms of surrender to aid in resettling the colonies.

SHOOTING ACCIDENTS.

Now Is the Season When Men Are Shot For Deer.

Tweed, Nov. 5.—A man by the name of Thomas Kennedy of Erinville was brought in on a stretcher here last evening, having been shot through the leg by Thomas Palmater of the same place. They were out deer shooting. Palmater mistook Kennedy for a deer and fired, hitting Kennedy just below the thigh, the bullet coming out on the other side of the leg.

Brother Shot For a Deer.

Cloversville, N.Y., Nov. 5.—While deer hunting near Piseco, Hamilton County, yesterday, William Abrams shot and killed his brother Frederick Abrams, aged 17, mistaking him for a deer. The boys were sons of Floyd Abrams of Piseco, an Adirondack guide.

Shot Himself by Accident.

Maple Creek, N.W.T., Nov. 5.—J. C. Martin, rancher, accidentally shot and killed himself Monday morning, while he and a friend were at work erecting a shack on a ranch. They noticed a flock of swans flying by and deceased went to get his rifle, which was standing against a plow, and in pulling it over, the trigger caught on some part of it, discharging its contents into Martin's body, using instantaneous death. An inquest was held, and a verdict of accidental death given.

FURTHER PECULATIONS DISCOVERED

Now Said That Treasurer Shambleau Has Gone to the States.

Chatham, Nov. 5.—Yesterday the County Council continued its special session called to deal with the defalcation of Treasurer Shambleau. The appointment of Clerk J. C. Fleming to the vacancy at a salary of \$1,200 was ratified by bylaw, and the ex-county councillor, Jonas Gosnell of Highgate, appointed to the clerkship at a salary of \$800. The clerk is required to furnish a \$1,000 bond, a new departure.

A cursory examination of the books of the ex-treasurer by Auditor Macpherson reveals other peculations amounting probably to \$6,000. The representative of the Guarantee Bond Company, who has already seized some of Shambleau's private property, says that the defaulting Treasurer has crossed the boundary. Most of Shambleau's personal surties live in and around Wallaceburg, Shambleau's native place.
