

PEOPLE TO AGAIN BE ASKED FOR A PUBLIC LIBRARY SITE

The Bylaw For \$2000 is to be Submitted Over Again in January

CEMENT WALKS HIGHER

Two Tenders Ask Fourteen and Three Quarter Cents a Foot - York-St Enterprise

Four deputations appeared before the meeting of committees on Saturday night. The first was Mr. Ancil Mills and Mr. W. B. Fee who asked that the cement walk on Caroline-st should be made 4 feet wide instead of 5.

The second was Mr. Albert Jewett who spoke in behalf of a petition from York-st people who want to be allowed to build that street between Kent and Russell streets.

The third was Mr. Crandell who wanted the fireman questioned as to their delay in arriving at the fire on Friday morning.

Mr. W. Flavelle and Rev. J. W. Macmillan were the fourth. They again asked council to provide a public library site.

The first two deputations were granted their requests; that of the third was refused and for the fourth, council promised to submit a bylaw at the January elections to raise \$2000 to buy a site with.

THE YORK-ST MATTER Mr. Jewett said that he and his neighbors would like to be allowed to underdrain York-st., grade it and put a foot of gravel on it.

Mr. Jewett-Pit gravel. Dr. Burrows-If you do you will have no better street than the others have been for 26 years. It will be better to take the street in with Kent and William streets and have all done under Mr. Campbell's direction.

Mr. Jewett-We are satisfied for Mr. Chalmers to oversee it.

Ald. Robson-It should be 4 feet wide. Dr. Burrows-We represent the people and when they ask a 4-foot walk we should give it.

THE FIREMEN SLOW Capt Crandell said the firemen did not reach the fire on Friday morning being for about an hour after it broke out. Their excuse was that they had received no alarm, and did not propose to go out until they had. That theory was new to the captain, and he believed to the rest of the town.

Ald. Horo-If the captain asks the Town Property Committee for an investigation he shall have one.

Chairman O'Reilly-That will cost \$20; do you want the job. Dr. Burrows-No I don't; just wait, it is not customary for the chairman to take part in discussions.

Mr. W. Flavelle-We have thought that if it is thought the park is the best site, it could be got in some way notwithstanding the legal aspect of the case.

Ald. Robson-Who would stop you from building there? Mr. Macmillan-I presume any citizen could get out an injunction.

THE WALK TENDERS The tenders left over, at Dr. Burrows' request from last meeting were opened.

MINOR MATTERS Wooden additions to the snowplow shares will throw the snow further out so that it will not fall back into the track so much.

THE CAROLINE-ST WALK It was proposed to build a cement walk 5 feet wide on Caroline-st for the entire length. Mr. Ancil Mills and Mr. W. B. Fee asked that it be made 4 feet wide and not go beyond lot 13 or a point south of the creek over which the work would be very expensive.

Ald. Robson-We present the deed to Mr. Carnegie; so we are not dealing with the library board, but with Mr. Carnegie.

Ald. O'Reilly-We cannot pledge next year's council. Ald. McDiarmid-Put the three sites on a ballot.

This proposition moved Ald. Robson to hearty laughter. Dr. Burrows-I have been much amused but very little instructed by the speech I have just heard.

Ald. McDiarmid-Nobody could instruct you. Dr. Burrows-The people wouldn't look at such a ballot as you talk of. I don't want the library near me. I believe a suitable site could be got south of my place and at a low price.

Ald. McDiarmid-Just another fool position. Dr. Burrows-I favor that site because we can get it for nothing.

Mr. W. Flavelle-The bylaw did not have a fair show last time. We propose to make a regular campaign with lantern views of the building. We have chosen the present plan after a lot of investigation and think we have a model plan.

An alderman-Will your plan cost as much as was reported in the paper? Mr. Flavelle-Those figures should not have been published. We agreed.

Dr. Burrows-It was the duty of the press to publish them. Mr. Flavelle-They were wrong; some member of the board acted in bad faith; we agreed not to tell what the figures were. The architect said in justice to his clients they should be kept secret.

Mr. W. Flavelle-We have more faith in the judgment of the board in selecting a site than in that of the people at large.

Dr. Burrows-The people are opposed to increasing the bonded debt. Rev. J. W. Macmillan-We could find no way of giving a choice of sites without hurting the general scheme.

Ald. O'Reilly-If the people vote heartily against using the park, the legislature would not legalize its use.
