THE POLICE MAGISTRATE

An efficient police magistrate is a force that makes for righteousness. Of Mr. Steers, the retiring official, it is only fair to say that, in the main, he has been an efficient officer. Coming to the position when its prestige was not of the highest, he so performed his duties as to make the police court the corrective and restraining agency that it ought to be.

Mr. Jackson, the new officer, comes to his position enjoying a very large measure of public confidence. He is a man of sound judgment, high ideals, and ample legal knowledge. By his service in the town council he no doubt got a grasp of public affairs, and a place in popular esteem that will be of great value in his new position.

THE ROSS MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

That from its revenues the Ross Hospital has paid all the expense of maintenance for the past ten months of its operation, is a fair indication that its success is assured. This will come as a distinct relief to those who had feared for the financial features of the institution. There is no doubt that there was a pronounced unbusiness lest to maintain the institution heavy grants from the town and county would be required. The grants made this year have been quite within reason, and that with them the hospital has been able to meet the expenses of its first year gives reason for the hope that they will not need to be increased in the future. The balance on the right side of the hospital statement is all the more gratifying because it was obtained without the government grant, which has yet to come.

The work done by the hospital is no less gratifying than its financial statement. To those who take only a passing interest in the hospital, it will be a surprise to learn from the report in another column, that 148 patients were treated there during the past ten months, and that of these only five died. It indicates that this hospital is not such a portal to eternity as many people regard institutions of that sort. A glance at the report shows further that over 10 per cent. of the total days' stay of patients at the hospital was enjoyed by those who paid nothing; 51 per cent. by those who paid only 40 cents a day—whereas the average cost of maintenance was actually \$1.46 per day per patient; 30 per cent. cost \$1 per day and only 7 per cent. the highest \$2 rate. When it is kept in mind that the board has rigidly adhered to the policy of placing patients in the classes that their ability to pay would warrant, it will be seen that the hospital is ministering chiefly to people whose means would not ordinarily afford them hospital treatment, and thus fulfilling the purpose of its founder and laying heavy claims upon the sympathies, appreciation and support of the community.

THAT COURT SCENE

That the Steers-Hopkins fracas was a disgrace nobody denies, or that it deserves punishment; that it has not been punished, justifies a good deal of criticism that has been directed against the delay. Col. Deacon cannot escape a great deal of the blame for the whole unfortunate occurrence. By allowing Mr. Steers to direct his irritating banter toward Mr. Hopkins all through the examination, and without a word of reproof, the colonel failed to maintain the dignity of the bench or the decency of a court-room, and precipitated the scene that followed. When the insult and assault had been exchanged by the lawyers, the magistrate was again remiss in not fining them on the spot. Summary vindication of the court's honor is the only dignified sort. Going about afterwards for some one to lay an information in cold blood can never take its place. The bench must not solicit defenders; it must peremptorily defend itself. With this quite natural after-the-fact clamor for justice we have some sympathy, but no action now can wholly redeem the situation.

By ordering one of its number to lodge an information, council has shown courage, and an inclination to meddle that is worthy of pandering vote-hunters. If council would mind its own business, its business might be better done; and after all that is quite as much interest to the average man as how lawyers treat each other at a closed-doors police court case. Moreover, by meddling in this case council exposes the town to a lawsuit that will make serious additions to the already bulky deficit. There is little doubt that if Messrs. Steers and Hopkins are fined, there

will be an appeal or two appeals. Then council will either have to back down or put up the money to fight these appeals in the higher courts. Does the town want to assume a task of that sort? There is something to be said for the spirit of justice that may have animated the aldermen, and the moral effect on the community of having punishment inflicted, but the results are not likely to be such as to warrant the risky officiousness of the council.

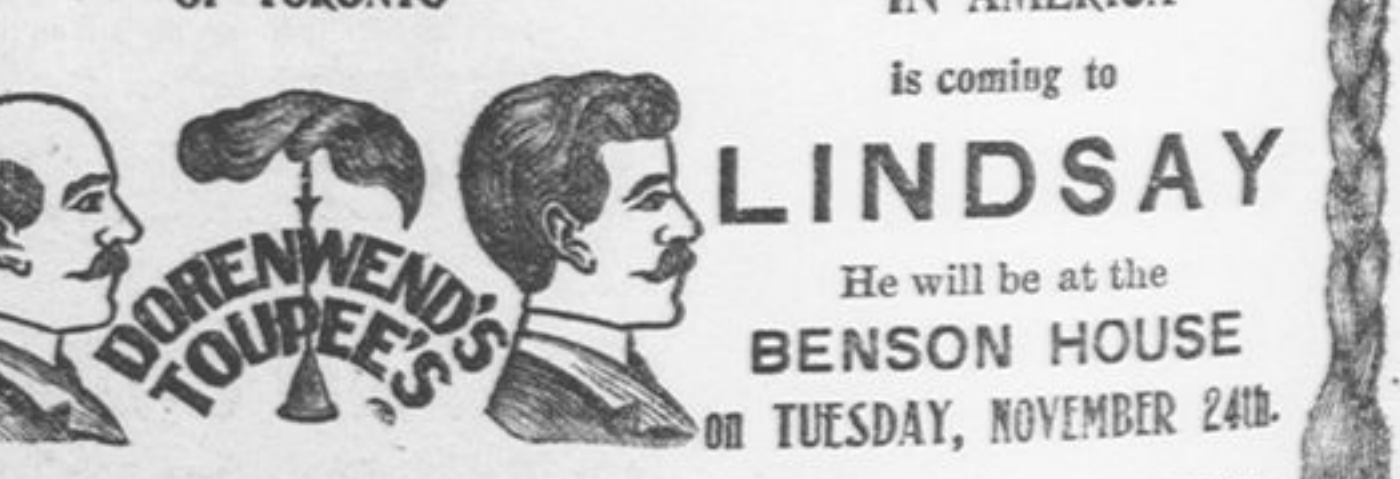

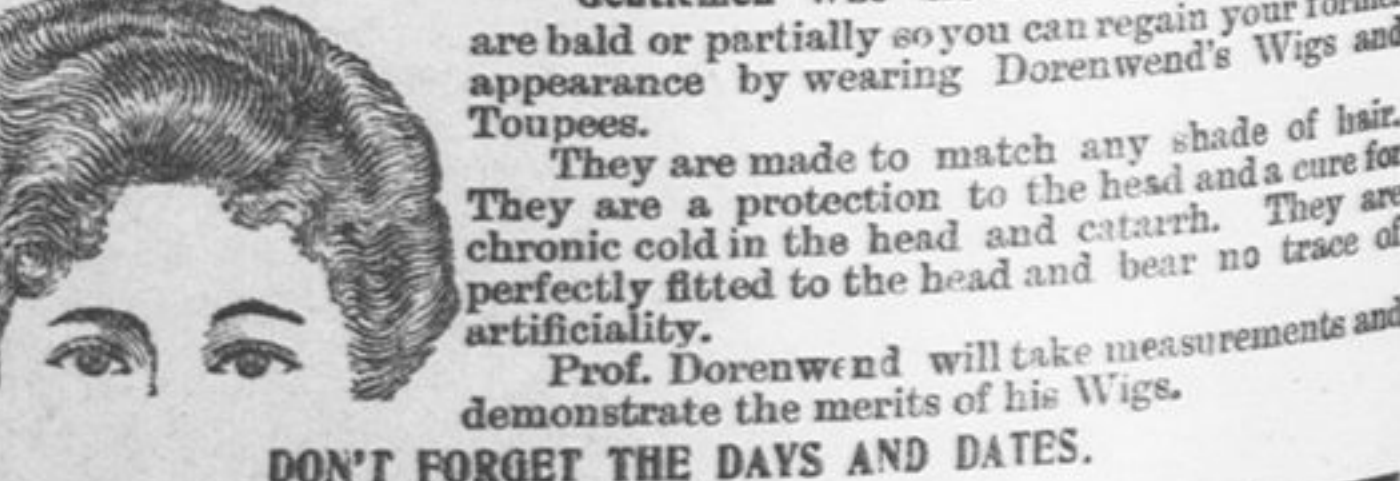
