POLITICAL NOTES

Provincial Conservatives will Let Quebec Go by Default—Seat for Aylesworth

Hon. Mr. Rudolphe Lemieux, solicitor general in the Laurier cabinet, and member by acclamation for Gaspereau, has offered the seat to Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, the new member of the cabinet who was defeated in Durham. Mr. Lemieux was elected in Nicolet also. It is believed Mr. Aylesworth will accept the seat.

NO FIGHT IN QUEBEC

The Quebec Conservatives under the leadership of Mr. E. J. Flynn have decided to nominate no candidates for the provincial elections which were to have been held on the 25th inst. Mr. Flynn's manifesto gives as his reason, the fact that the elections were rushed on, not giving sufficient time to discuss the issues, and in the hope of following up the Laurier sweep in Quebec.

LAURIER GOING SOUTH

It is said that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will shortly leave for a few weeks of rest at some southern health resort. It is believed that because Hon. Mr. Belcourt speaker of the late House, was speaker for only one session, he will be re-elected.

SHORT EARLY SESSION

The expectation is that there will be a short session of the new parliament early next year; after that the Tariff Commission will sit, and after an exhaustive investigation, the commission will have its report ready for the session of 1906.

ODD FOLK DOWN THERE

Two Peterboro merchants made a peculiar bet on the Hall-Kendry election. The loser was to keep the snow cleared away from not only the pavement in front of his own store but from that in front of his neighbor's also. The supporter of Mr. Kendry will have to double work this winter.

BETTER THAN LAURIER

In the Newfoundland elections held last week Premier Bond's government was sustained by 29 of the 34 seats. On Tuesday night the Toronto News said that the Ross government would likely go to the country on a temperance policy which proposed making a general prohibition, but allowing any municipality by a vote of the people, to allow liquor selling in its boundaries.

GAMEY FIGURED.

Gamey cut quite a figure in the recent elections. He worked hard in Manitoulin, and the Conservative was elected. He spoke in Peel and his man got in. He addressed a meeting in Durham, and Aylesworth went down, while in South York Maclean was elected.

STRATTON HONORED.

On Tuesday evening Hon. J. R. Stratton gave a banquet at the parliament buildings, Toronto, to the superintendents of the institutions and heads of departments. It is regarded as a sort of farewell event, for the provincial secretary is likely leaving provincial political life. He was presented with a cabinet of silver by his guests.

WHAT WHITNEY THINKS

"I've no means of knowing whether there'll be a dissolution. It is quite clear to me, however, that Mr. Ross is not entitled to a dissolution as by means of his peculiar tactics there is no result yet from the election of 1902," said Mr. J. P. Whitney on Tuesday evening to the Toronto World. "We will, however," continued Mr. Whitney, "welcome an opportunity given to the people to say whether this discreditable ministry shall remain any longer in power."

ROSS GOING TO THE COUNTRY; ELECTIONS ON NEXT MONTH

It is Semi-Officially Stated That They Will Come Before Christmas—Cabinet Changes

It is generally believed that Premier Ross will go to the country next month. They day named for voting is Dec. 13. In the meantime the Cabinet will be reconstructed. On Saturday the Toronto Star (Lib.) made the following forecast: 1. The resignation of Mr. Stratton as Provincial Secretary, the office to be filled by Mr. G. P. Graham. 2. The resignation of Mr. Davis as Commissioner of Crown Lands, the office to be filled by Mr. W. A. Charlton. 3. The resignation of Mr. Latchford as Commissioner of Public Works, the office to be filled probably by Mr. Peter Ryan. 4. The dissolution of the Legislature with the elections before Christmas. 5. A declaration of policy on temperance and one or two other subjects for new legislation. The Premier has already received verbal resignations from the Cabinet Ministers named, and before the announcement is made he will receive letters confirming intimation.

WHAT WILL ROSS DO?

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Significant Remarks About It.

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier was at Blackwater on his way to speak at Orillia during the recent campaign he was met by Mr. Geo. Grant who was the Liberal member in the last parliament for North Ontario. Mr. Grant who by the way is again the member, introduced to Sir Wilfrid Mr. Hoyle, the Conservative member for the same riding in the provincial Legislature.

OMEMEE AND FALLS CHEER

On Monday afternoon in response to an invitation from his political friends at Omemee and in Emily township Col. Hughes went down to attend a congratulatory reception at the village. There went with the colonel a few friends from here. The reception was a great success. This wound up at Bradburn's Opera House which was crowded with enthusiastic electors. Dr. Cornwall, president of the Emily Conservative Association was in the chair. Congratulations on behalf of the electors of that part of the riding were extended to Col. Hughes by Mr. H. B. Harvey. Happy speeches were made by a number of prominent Conservatives, and Col. Hughes replied in his own felicitous and inspiring fashion.
