FAILURE OF LIBERALS
Mr. Borden at Kincardine Makes Strong Arraignment

Mr. Borden, leader of the Opposition, spoke in the bye-election campaign in North Bruce, and at Kincardine his strong arraignment of

the Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier is thus reported in the Mail and Empire:

After expressing his appreciation of the addresses read to him, he devoted his attention to the public questions of the day. The conditions at Ottawa to-day should be considered carefully by everybody in the country. In the first place, he asked what was one of the absolute needs of our system of party government. So

far as public expenditure was concerned, at least, and so far as matters of policy were concerned, it was absolutely necessary that there should be in the Parliament of Canada, and especially in the House of Commons, a strong and vigorous Opposition, strong and vigorous enough sometimes to save the Government from itself and from those elements of the party, the camp followers, who were to-day surrounding the Liberals at Ottawa, and who, tomorrow, if the Conservative party came into power, would suddenly confess Conservative principles and be just as willing to camp upon the outskirts of the Conservative party. Had not the people of North Bruce understood this, and sent to Ottawa in the late Mr. Bland a man who was a great assistance to the Opposition in thus sustaining the Government against its enemies? Had there been any change since then which should induce them now to send a Liberal representative to Ottawa? He had known of no such change, and it appeared to be the duty of the rising to-day to send another Conservative to Parliament.

GOVERNMENT'S ILLOGICAL POSITION.
Speaking of the Autonomy Bills, Mr. Borden showed that the Government's position was an illogical one, and that they had in reality gone back on their record and forced an education system upon the two new provinces. He was firmly of the belief that the solution of that question, which the Opposition opposed in the House of Commons—provincial control of the education system—was the true solution, and one which it would have been wise for the Government to follow, and which would have resulted in the end in much less difficulty, much less acrimony, and much less hard feeling than was

likely to be the case under the Act as it was passed.

The inconsistencies of the Lord's Day Act were exposed by Mr. Borden in a lucid manner, and the audience understood as they never had before the ridiculous contradictions of the bill. The most instructive feature of the matter was that Mr. Piche and Mr. Bourassa, the strongest and most uncompromising opponents of the bill in its original form, were absolutely satisfied with it in its final form, because it meant nothing and could not be enforced. From the Hansard reports of the House Mr. Borden showed that Mr. Aylesworth had declared that Mr. Piche's amendment to the bill would absolutely destroy its effect. Ten days later he and the rest of the Liberals accepted the amendment and thereby actually destroyed the bill.

PROSPERITY NOT DUE TO LIBERALS.
Much had been said by the Liberal speakers about Canada's prosperity. The opposition was quite willing to admit the country's prosperity, but they had yet to learn of any single act of the Laurier Government which had conducted to the prosperity. That prosperity was due to conditions existing all over the world, and to the industry and perseverance of Canadians themselves. Where were the great public works built by the Liberals? The G.T.P. had only been commenced, nothing more had been done to the canals than had been done by the Conservatives. Where then had all the money which the Liberals had spent gone? The Government's ideas of economy had greatly changed since they came into power. They had objected to an expenditure of forty million dollars by the Conservatives, and the great resulting taxation as they put it. When they came to power they quickly increased the expenditure to over double that amount.

FOR CLEAN ELECTIONS.
There were some subjects which were above and beyond all questions of party. If democratic government was to be successful, there were three primary essentials. The first fact was that there must be clean elections, secondly, there must be honest expenditure of public money and in the third place, they must have due appointments to public offices. Had the present Government lived up to the proper ideal in these three regards? Had there been clean elections? Had there not rather been of late an unparalleled orgy of political corruption? A few instances of this were alone sufficient as examples. Some of them were, the West Elgin, Huron, Brockville, Montreal, and Prince Albert election outrages. What was Mr. Tolmie's record in regard to the demand for an investigation and punishment of the perpetrators of these frauds. He had voted at one with the other Liberals to block the investigations into the West Huron and Brockville cases from being finished, when the evidence had already proved the existence of widespread frauds. Every man who voted to burke that investigation was in one sense responsible for the revelry of corruption, which had prevailed in the country ever since.

A CASE IN POINT.
Mr. Borden recalled the case of Mr. Wagner, the Government interpreter in the Northwest, who was convicted of defrauding the foreigners whose rights he was supposed to protect. He was convicted of embezzling the money of these people, and served his time in prison for the crimes. For part of the time that he was in prison he was paid his salary at the solicitation of Mr. Oliver, the present Minister of the Interior. When he came out of prison he was rewarded by being given two new positions. Formerly he had been receiving \$40 a month, but upon his release he obtained from the Government one position at \$25 and another at \$75 a month. When the Opposition called for Mr. Wagner's dismissal or an investigation in the matter, the Government voted the motion down, and Wagner was still occupying his two positions in Edmonton, and drawing \$1,200 a year.

All these things proved that the Government of this country was not unwilling to put aside investigations into the acts of its machine heeled, and safeguard them, and was not unwilling to appoint its partisans to high office as a reward for crimes and irregularities which they had committed in the party service.

Mr. Borden passed in review many acts of the Government's iniquitous acts, and concluded by urging upon his hearers that if they wanted a pure and honest administration of public affairs in Canada they must show it by their votes.

IMPROVEMENT OF HORSES.
Messrs. J. G. Clark, of Ottawa, and James Irving, Manchester, were through East Victoria last week inspecting horses and gathering information. This week they have inspected in West Victoria, accompanied by Mr. W. Channon, President of the Farmers' Institute, and closed up yesterday. Last night a public meeting was held in the council chamber, Lindsay, addressed by the commissioners, of which an extended report will appear in next week's Watchman-Warder. Messrs. Clark and Irving had previously been through Hastings and Peterborough counties, and still have to go through Northumberland and Prince Edward. They have not found ideal conditions so far, but in Victoria the class of horses, generally speaking, is better, they report, than in Hastings and Peterborough.

Women Ask Place in Methodist General Conference
Belleville, Oct. 25.—The board of managers of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist church elected the following officers to-day: President, Mrs. W. E. Ross, Hamilton; first vice-president, Mrs. A. Carman, Toronto; recording secretary, Mrs. Phillips; field corresponding secretary, Mrs. Strachan; home corresponding secretary, Mrs. McKay; treasurer, Miss Wilkes; editor of The Outlook, Miss McCallum; editor of The Palm Branch, Miss Lathern; treasurer rest fund, Mrs. W. W. Ogden; auditor for rest fund, J. Earl; auditor for the board, Arthur Lawson. A resolution was passed ordering the presentation of a memorial to the next general conference of the Methodist church, asking that women in future be given a place in the councils of the Methodist Church in Canada.

SHOT BEAR IN TURNIP FIELD.
A report comes from Birdsall, says the Peterborough Review, that bears are roaming through the fields that neighborhood. Friday afternoon last Mr. Richard Birdsall was working in his turnip field, and was being assisted by Mr. Ed. Taylor. When Mr. Birdsall was standing up, so as to rest his back, he saw something running through the field. He declared it was a big dog, but Taylor recognized the animal at first glance, and tried to convince Mr. Birdsall that it was a bear. Finally the proprietor of the farm was persuaded to shoot and take a chance. He did shoot and the bullet struck the animal's ear. Then Taylor took a shot at it and the bullet entered the bear's mouth and killed it. Taylor was right. It was a bear, and a fine, healthy young one too. In fact, it was nearly full grown. The old bear's tracks were traced into a tamarac swamp near Birdsall station.

TYPHOID FEVER OUTBREAK.
Toronto, Oct. 29.—"Boil the water before using for domestic purposes." That is the chief advice Dr. C. A. Hodgett, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, has to give to residents in municipalities where typhoid fever is more than usually prevalent. He has just returned with Dr. Amyot, the Provincial Bacteriologist, from the convention of New York State Health Officers, at Oswego, N. Y., which was held at the G. P. R. Cartier, on the main line west of Sudbury, Sturgeon Falls, and Wahnapiite, east of Sudbury, and the latter town itself. There are scores of cases of the fever throughout the district. Dr. Bell says, but there have not been many deaths. The two hospitals at Sudbury are full of typhoid fever patients, mostly from the camps. One reason of the influx into Sudbury is the ticket system arrangement with lumbermen. They pay \$3 to \$5, for which they receive a ticket entitling them in case of sickness or accident to six months' or one year's maintenance in the hospital, according to the amount paid. At present as soon as any of the men so insured begin to feel the fever coming on they go to the hospitals at Sudbury or the Soo. Dr. Hodgett says that, at the convention, it was a point reiterated and emphasized that typhoid fever outbreaks were nearly all due to water pollution.
