FIGHTING AGAINST INSECTS IN THE FALL

BY PROF. C. J. S. BETHUNE OF THE ONTARIO AGRICULTUR-AL COLLEGE.

The time of year has now arrived when most of our insect foes have ceased their active work and are withdrawn from active work and consequently most people come to the conclusion that the season's fight is over and that nothing need at present be done. But this is very far from being the case. There are many destructive insects that can be more easily dealt with now than at any other time of the year.

First and foremost, the Pea-weev il. The losses from this insect have been very much lessened during the last two seasons in Ontario, but this does not mean that we have got rid of the trouble. The same treatment should be used for the Bean-weevil, which is a serious pest in some parts of the Province. In addition to this treatment of the peas themselves, the pea-straw and rubbish should be cleared up and burnt and all refuge where threshing has been done should be similarly got rid of. This will destroy any weevils that have already come out and are hiding away for the winter.
