By-Laws to be Submitted At the Municipal Elections

One to Extend Term of Members of Council to Two Years and another to Grant Bonus and Exemption of Taxes to Carson Glove Factory

At the regular meeting of the Town Council on Monday night the principal business transacted was the decision to submit a by-law at the municipal elections to grant a cash bonus of \$1,000 and free water, exemption of taxes for five years, except school taxes, and another five years on certain conditions to the Canadian Carson Glove Company; also a by-law to extend the term of members of Council to two years. The latter, if adopted, will come in force in 1908.

On reference to the minutes it was found that the matter had been referred to the Finance Committee which had not since met. Mr. Elliott was informed that the matter would be looked into.

George Foster was appointed collector of poll tax instead of John Short.

There were present Mayor Vrooman, Ald. Begg, Maunder, O'Reilly, Eyres, and Fisher.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter was read from S. A. Armstrong, Inspector of Prisons and Asylums, containing names of persons in the asylums from this municipality, who were paying less than \$1.50 per week, and stating that a charge of ten cents per day for each would be made against the municipality. The letter stated that it was probable that some of the persons, twenty-five in number, may have been incorporated as returned as from the municipality, and requested that it be corrected. This was referred to Finance Committee.

Dr. P. Palmer Burrows wrote complaining that his property was depreciated on account of livery barn adjoining. The letter was filed.

A Barrie firm wrote regarding snow plows. Referred to Board of Works.

Mrs. Kate Soans asked remission of taxes. Referred to Council of 1907.

Mr. R. J. McLaughlin wrote enclosing draft of petition to Government similar to one sent from Peterborough asking that water level on chain of lakes be maintained at 8 feet, Government to pay damages to property.

On motion of Ald. O'Reilly the Mayor was instructed to sign the petition. The Board of Trade will also be asked to sign.

The Secretary of Power Union of Western Ontario Municipalities wrote enclosing copy of proceedings of meeting held at Galt last summer, copies of Power Act, etc., also asking statement of electric energy in horse power required in Lindsay. This was referred to Police and Lighting Committee.

The Canadian Westinghouse Co., and the Canadian General Electric Company gave prices of street light indicators. These were referred to Police and Lighting Committee.

Driver Bell addressed the Council in reference to an indicator in the fire hall to show the number of box from which alarm was sent when only partially pulled.—Police and Lighting Committee.

Mr. McGraw, G.T.R. agent, wrote in reference to complaint of unnecessary whistling of locomotives. Clerk Knowlson said that Mr. Irwin had stated that the nuisance would be abated, and the communication was filed.

W. Dalby asked that ditch on Durham street between Bay and Albert streets be cleaned.—Board of Works.

W. Abbot asked sewer connection for new house he is building on lot 7 St. Lawrence street. The request was granted on the usual conditions.

John Gallahan asked a reduction of taxes for 1905 on his property in the south ward. This went to Finance Committee.

Accounts for the month were read and referred to the respective committees.

The Market Clerk reported weighing fees for month of October \$66.30; market fees, \$6.54; non-resident butcher license \$25; total \$96.84.

The Council then adjourned.

REGULAR MEETING OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

ANOTHER LONG DISCUSSION OVER ADMISSION OF TWO BOYS—SALARY QUESTION TO BE DEALT WITH AT ADJOURNED MEETING.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education was held in the Council Chamber on Tuesday evening.

Present Messrs. Stewart, Chairman, Flavell, Jackson, Staples, McIntyre, Anderson, Carew, Drs. Blanchard and White.

Misses Sybil L. Jewell and F. Daisy Walker wrote tendering their resignations as teachers in the Public schools.

Principal Harstone reported the registered attendance as 319 with average attendance for October of 197. It enclosed statement of fees up to October 31st; town pupils, \$192.50; county pupils, \$110; outside pupils, \$33; total \$335.50.

A statement of receipts for science department was also enclosed, with request that the balance, as usual, be retained and expended for museum.

The request was granted.

Mr. Alex. Paton addressed the Board on behalf of himself and Mr. Geo. Simpson in regard to the admission of their boys to the Collegiate Institute, who had passed the written entrance examination, but had not passed the first part and been recommended by their Public school teacher. This matter, it will be remembered, was up at last meeting.

A discussion of some length then took place in which the chairman, and Messrs. Flavell, Staples, Carew, Anderson, Jackson, Drs. White and Blanchard, and Principal Harstone took part, in which some contention was had as to whether the boys should be admitted or not.

Principal Harstone explained in reference to the admission of two girls who had failed in one subject of the second part of the examination, the written, that the board of examiners had discretionary power in that case.

It appeared from the discussion that there was some doubt in the mind of the teacher as to whose direction he was under, the Chairman of the Board of Works, or the Town Commissioner.

It was stated that this work was ordered by resolution of Council and had no right to be countermanded by the Chairman of the Board of Works.

Mayor Vrooman thought this was not the proper time to put on gravel. It should have been done in June, though as this work was ordered to be done, it might be well to put on an extra team.

In the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Works the Mayor was instructed to draw gravel on King street on Tuesday morning, and to have an extra team engaged if necessary.

A Wood Case

The county court action of William Richman against the executors of the late Hugh Wilson, of Cannington, was tried by Judge Harding on Monday.

It was for balance of contract for 500 cords of wood on which he claimed a price of \$1.70 per cord, the late Mr. Wilson having, it was claimed, promised this, although the first agreement was for \$1.60. Judgment was given for \$51.20, balance on 497 7/8 cords at \$1.60, the measurement by a man agreed to, each party to pay their own costs.

F. A. McHardy for plaintiff; R. J. McLaughlin, K.C., and A. J. Reid, of Cannington, for defendants. John Richman v. same defendants, was settled out of court.

The Home for the Aged Surplus

To the Editor of the Watchman-Warder.

Sir,—The board of management of the Home for the Aged are, I understand, open for suggestions as to how they may best dispose of the funds on hand. Permit me to suggest a practical plan. There is in our town an institution that has done, and is doing much for the uplifting of the young men and boys. I refer to the Young Men's Christian Association.

This enterprise has been carried on with varying degrees of success. It has had its ups and downs, and yet has been able to accomplish much good. The Y.M.C.A. is purely un-nominal and unsectarian, any young man of moral character may belong to it. There is no distinction made between black or white, Jew or Gentile, and when we consider that for every \$3 membership ticket issued \$10 in addition has to come from subscriptions, truly this is in one sense, a charitable institution. And then, too, it is well to consider that its sole aim and purpose is to help young men to become better citizens building them up physically, mentally and morally.

In Lindsay the Y.M.C.A. is seriously handicapped for the want of a suitable place in which to carry on its work effectively. If such towns as Midland, Orillia, Owen Sound, and Port Hope can support well-equipped plants, why cannot our town do so? It is a crying shame that I do say is so far behind in the race. Now what better use could this money be put to than to form a nucleus for a new Y.M.C.A. building. The matter is certainly worthy of consideration.

OPS COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

A regular meeting of Ops Council was held on Monday, October 29th, with all members present. The minutes of last regular and special meetings were read by the clerk and duly confirmed on motion of Messrs. Best and Wilson.

The revee said he had gone to view the watercourse at Mr. Jones' Reynolds' and that Mr. Reynolds had agreed to put in a culvert at the road-ditch near his gate where the water has been held back, and Mr. Coulter had made an outlet into the O'Leary drain, which will, it is hoped, remove the grievance complained of.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter from Mr. Smith, engineer, stating that he had located and staked out the courses of the McLeod, Stony Creek, and Kennedy-Jones' Drains, which form one system, having a total length of 7 1/2 miles.

A certificate from the engineer, too, in favor of Thos. O'Neill, for assisting in the work, amounting to \$40.

A petition from James Whalen and others for drainage under the Ditches and Water-courses Act, and another from John Hartnett and others praying that the engineer locate a drain near Hartnett's corner.

The revee, on motion, signed both petitions on behalf of the Township, and the clerk was instructed to notify the engineer accordingly.

Mr. Owen Traynor, owner of lot No. 7, con. 6, objected in strong terms to the proposed line of Stony Creek drain across his hardwood land without his permission, but was pleased to learn from the council that the engineer had reconsidered the matter and altered the original course on his place.

The clerk was instructed to request Mariposa council to deliver the county stone crusher at Bryson's corner, 5th quarter line, that Ops council may use it.

The clerk was also instructed to write to the Mayors and Fenelon Council and ask them to remit Ops treasurer the balances due Ops for boundary work.

The council after expressing their regret at the demise of the late Thos. Calvert, a member of Ops Board of Health, appointed Mr. Fred Hickson to fill the vacancy, on motion of Messrs. Coulter and Wilson.

On motion of Messrs. Roche and Coulter Mr. Best was authorized to clean out the drain complained of by Mr. James Kennedy.

At the instance of Mr. N. Brady the pathmaster of Beat 18, who was present, was instructed to remove a fence crossing the second quarter line at 4th con. road.

As the swing-bridge south of Lindsay is to be replaced by a new one, the council has lately inspected the approaches thereto, and found that they are in need of repair—especially the west one—and as the total length of the bridge is 400 feet or more they are of opinion that it should be classed as a county bridge since it is on a leading road and is used by other municipalities trading in Lindsay.

A resolution was, accordingly, passed on motion of Messrs. Best and Coulter, that application be made to the County Council in November session requesting that they assume it, or the county judge will be requested to issue an order declaring it to be a county bridge to be built and maintained by the County of Victoria.

On motion of Messrs. Roche and Wilson the following bills and accounts were paid:

Geo. Murphy, work on 2nd gr. line, \$25.00; B. O'Connell, bonus for wire fence, \$21.00; John Wilson, cleaning out drain, \$12.00; Thos. O'Neill, work under engineer, \$40.00; Geo. Griffin, for gravel, \$8.48; Thos. Waldon, for gravel, \$9.80; Jas. Fanning, for gravel, \$1.68; Robt. Winn, for gravel, \$1.70; Albert and M. Shea, for ditching, \$2.10; N. Brady, for ditching, 75c.

On motion of Messrs. Roche and Coulter council adjourned at 5:30 p.m. to meet at the call of the Revee.
