#### NOT QUALIFIED TO TEACH ONTARIO SCHOOLS

THIS IS THE DECISION OF THE PRIVY COUNCIL AS TO THE CHRISTIAN BROTHERS.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—The Privy Council has decided that the Christian Brothers are not qualified to teach in the schools of Ontario.

A cablegram received this morning announces that the appeal of "the Christian Brothers" against the Minister of Education of Ontario had been dismissed by the Privy Council. In this case a Separate School teacher at Ottawa through what is known as the Bi-Lingual Association contended that under the educational clauses of the British North America Act the sect known as the Christian Brothers were not qualified to teach in the schools of Ontario.

The question was carried to the courts, and was tried by Judge McMahon, who decided against the Christian Brothers.

Against this decision the Christian Brothers appealed, and the Court of Appeal upheld the judgment of Judge McMahon.

A TEST QUESTION.  
The appeal was then carried to the Privy Council in the form of a stated case as follows, the Minister of Education of Ontario joining the respondent:

"Are members of the communities, including the Brothers of the Christian Schools, and certain religious communities composed of persons of the female sex, including the Community General Hospital, Alms House and Seminary of Learning, and the Sisters of Charity, commonly called Grey Nuns, who became members of such communities since the passing of the British North America Act, 1867, to be considered qualified teachers for the purpose of the Separate Schools Act, and therefore eligible for employment as teachers in the Roman Catholic Separate Schools within the Province of Ontario, where such members have not received certificates of qualification to teach in the Public of the Province?"

FAR-REACHING DECISION.  
The question was argued before that body on July 17th last, and according to the cablegram, the Privy Council has answered it in the negative, which means that the defendants in the action are not qualified under the Act.

This decision is a very far-reaching one, affecting particularly the Roman Catholic Separate Schools of the Province.

It is apparent that the Ontario Government will have to issue permits to many teachers in those

schools, change the Act, or compel every teacher to qualify himself or herself in accordance with the provisions of the present Act.

Dr. John Seath, Superintendent of Education, when asked as to what steps would have to follow the decision, said: "All I can say at the present time is that the Department will not deal with this important matter in a sectional spirit, but will seek to consider only the general public good."

#### MOLEHILL MAGNIFIED INTO A MOUNTAIN

INSPECTOR KNIGHT FINDS LITTLE DISSATISFACTION WITH NEW SCHOOL LAW.

To the Editor of The Watchman-Warder.  
Sir,—With respect to a remark in the Post that there is a wide-spread dissatisfaction about the salaries to be paid teachers, allow me to say that, at the request of the Minister of Education, I invited the trustees of 41 rural schools to meet me to discuss the changes in the law. At 40 schools I had an aggregate of 91 trustees, and only one trustee expressed dissatisfaction at the salary question or any other change in the law.

#### The Town Pump Condemned in Oshawa as well as Lindsay

In view of the remarks of Chairman Flavell, Mayor Vrooman and others at the meeting of the Board of Governors of the Ross Memorial Hospital on Thursday evening last, the following from the Oshawa Vindicator will be of interest:

The annual scourge has again arrived. Not so severe in type nor so vast in quantity as in some previous years, but nevertheless the typhoid season is upon us with far too many people ill, and far too many others dying or dead. No one has a right to die of typhoid fever in Oshawa. It is absolutely a preventable disease. Some one is to blame for every funeral procession upon the streets of the town, when the cause of the death is typhoid fever. Of the many homes afflicted in Oshawa to-day there is not a single case where the people are using water from the town supply. The Board of Health should wherever typhoid exists, attack the dear old family well, and have it immediately annihilated. It may seem harsh to put such a sudden check upon

#### A WRECK ON THE G.T.R. NEAR MARIPOSA STATION

SEVEN FREIGHT CARS OF THE WHITBY MIXED LEAVE THE TRACK—NO PERSON INJURED.

On Wednesday night of last week an accident occurred on the Whitby, Port Perry and Lindsay division of the G.T.R., which fortunately was not attended by either loss of life or injury to any person. As the Whitby mixed due to arrive at Mariposa at 8.35 and at Lindsay at 8.45 struck the bridge west of Mariposa, six cars of coal and one of grain, left the track, and were precipitated into the gully below. The passenger coaches in the rear fortunately remained on the track and the passengers got off with a severe jolting and without injury. The accident was due to the breaking of an axle on one of the freight cars. The passengers were brought into Lindsay by a train sent out from here.

A considerable portion of the track was torn up, the bridge was damaged to some extent, and it took Thursday and Friday to remove the debris and temporarily repair the bridge. In the interval passenger trains for Toronto and Whitby had to be sent around by Lorneville Junction.

What Peterboro Asks as to Development of Power.

A deputation from Peterboro waited first upon the Premier and later upon Hon. Messrs. Beck and Hendrie of the Hydro-electric Power Commission at the Parliament buildings last week in regard to the request that the municipality mentioned be allowed to develop power on the Otonabee River for the supply of electric energy and light for municipal purposes. The Premier referred the deputation to the commission, to the members of which the deputation recalled that a city of Peterboro's bill seeking the power now asked was defeated in one of the committees of the Legislature as the result of contention over the "Connex clauses" of the municipal were informed that if Peterboro decides by formal action of the Council act, designed to protect private gas, electric and other enterprises. They to deal with the commission the case would not be affected in any way by the Connex clauses. The deputation promised to have the matter brought before the Peterboro Council, and to have the formal methods of dealing with the commission followed.
