—Charles Fuller, the veteran lockmaster at Burleigh Falls, lost his life on Wednesday night, November 7, by falling into the lock.

—Managers will vote on a local option by-law at the municipal elections. The Millbrook Reporter says: Reeve Hickson is in the field again for the chief chair, without any likelihood of opposition. Messrs. Hooper and Staples are both dropping out at New Year's. Councillors Bruce and McMaster are said to be ready to face each other for Deputy Reeve. We have not heard of the old warhorse Mr. two McArthur; but he will most likely be to the front again.

—David Henderson, night watchman of the Knight Bros. Company's factory, Burk's Falls, was killed by the accidental discharge of his gun while out hunting.

—A rumour having been circulated that the town water in Orillia was impure samples were sent to Dr. Annot, Provincial analyst, with the result that he declares that they show neither chemical pollution nor infection with harmful bacteria.

—Win. E. Newton, a prominent farmer of Hope township, was returning from Port Hope on Saturday night, November 3, lost his route, his wagon overturned and he lay under it till found in the morning. He died shortly afterwards of internal injuries received.

—Rev. Dr. Marsh has decided to accept the call of the congregations of Springville and Bethany, in the Presbytery of Peterborough, where his work in the interest of science has made his name prominent all over Canada. Dr. Marsh, while a deep student of science and an ardent lover of astronomy, in which he is one of Canada's foremost authorities, is an earnest Christian and a progressive citizen.—Hamilton Times.

—Dr. E. B. Cowan, of Blackstock, has bought the practice and good will of Dr. S. S. Dickinson, of Port Hope.

—The large brick stable belonging to the Windsor Hotel, Belleville, was destroyed by fire, supposed to be of incendiary origin on Wednesday morning, November 7. Lee Ketchison's famous trotter, Jim K., with other horses, was saved with considerable difficulty.

—Newtownville Presbyterians celebrated their fiftieth anniversary on Sunday and Monday, November 4 and 5.

—Port Hope Guide: The survey party under charge of Mr. D. Hillman, C.E., has completed the work of the preliminary survey of Port Hope and vicinity, and are removing to Bowmanville this week. The line as projected will be almost level and will not anywhere exceed a three-fourth grade, or three feet in a hundred. It is declared that an engine can start on a dead level rail and pull with ease up this grade. The projected line, according to the present survey, will strike at the heart of every town on the front. As Mr. Hillman puts it, the C.P.R. is out for business and the line will be located to suit the passenger and freight requirements of the country through which it passes.

IMPORTANT TAX DECISION.

In dealing with appeals from the London Court of Revision, Judge Elliott made an important decision on Nov. 5. Assessment Commissioner Grant had assessed each wholesale butcher who occupies a space on the market for a business tax, placing the minimum assessment on each butcher. The butchers claimed they were not liable for the tax, as they had no place of business in London. The Judge decided they must pay the tax.

CHOOSE YELLOW HEAD PASS.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The Grand Trunk Pacific has decided upon the Yellow Head Pass as the one which it is to use to reach the Pacific coast. This has been done after careful surveys. The Government will be asked to approve this pass, which will give a grade through the Rocky Mountains of about four-tenths of one per cent.

GOOD ROADS FOR PEEL. Peel County good roads by-law has been approved by the Government. It provides for the construction of 100 miles of road, which, connecting with the Hurontario Road, through Simcoe, the oldest road in the Province, will complete a macadam road from Lake Ontario to Lake Huron. It is the intention of the Peel County Council to raise \$100,000 for the new system, the government grant in addition being \$50,000. In the Province there have now been 2,000 miles of road built under the good roads system.
