CLOSING MEETING OF THE CHEESE BOARD

LAST OF SEASON'S MAKE SOLD AT LINDSAY ON MONDAY FOR TWELVE CENTS.

There were but 817 boxes of cheese sold at the final meeting of the Victoria County Cheese Board on Monday, most of the factories having closed before the previous meeting. The price paid was 12 cents. The following were boarded:

Forty of the Mariposa factory were made in November. Mr. Gillespie started the bidding at 11, followed by Messrs. Flavell's buyer at 11 1/2. Mr. Gillespie then went 11, followed by Messrs. Flavell's buyer at 11 1/2. Mr. Gillespie then went 11, followed by Mr. Brown at 11, and Flavell's at 11 1/2-16. There was considerable delay then sellers not being willing to accept that figure. Mr. Brown finally made it 12. The buyers claimed that 12 1/2 paid at Peterborough last week was not a fair standard, as much of what was sold at Peterborough had a flavor of turnips and when the buyers discov-

ered this the price mentioned at the board was not paid. President Robertson said there were no turnips fed in this district, and the buyers responded that this was correct and in buying here they felt confident that the cheese would all be free from such flavor. Mr. Brown got Mariposa, North Verulam and Maple Leaf, Mr. Gillespie North Ops, Dunsford and Star, Mr. Flavell Bobcaygeon and Reaboro and Mr. Cook, of Belleville, Red Rock and Omeme. One pound per box was deducted, and for the November make, three or four.

Carotaker Wilson was voted the usual acknowledgment for his services, and the President congratulated both the sellers and the buyers on the very satisfactory nature of the season's proceedings of the board, the ninth of its history. There had been no complaint of the action of buyers during the season, and only on one or two occasions since the board was organized. He thanked the reporters also for their correct reports, and made special reference to the services rendered the board from its very inception by the late Mr. George Lytle, of The Watchman-Warder.

PETERBOROUGH'S LAST SALE. Peterborough, Nov. 7.—The last meeting of the Peterborough Cheese Board was held this morning when the highest price paid was 12 1/2 cents per pound. The total offering was 3,279 boxes and all sold but two factories. The meeting was made-

pecially interesting by the presence of Mr. N. G. Summerville, of Brockville, superintendent of the Government cool curing room at that point, and Mr. Ward, dairy instructor for the district of Peterborough. Both gentlemen gave addresses of a most instructive nature that were listened to with great interest. Nearly all the factories in this section have ceased operations for the season and any cheese that remains to be disposed of will be sold at the factories. The salesmen were looking for higher prices, but the buyers could not go higher on account of the condition of the market.

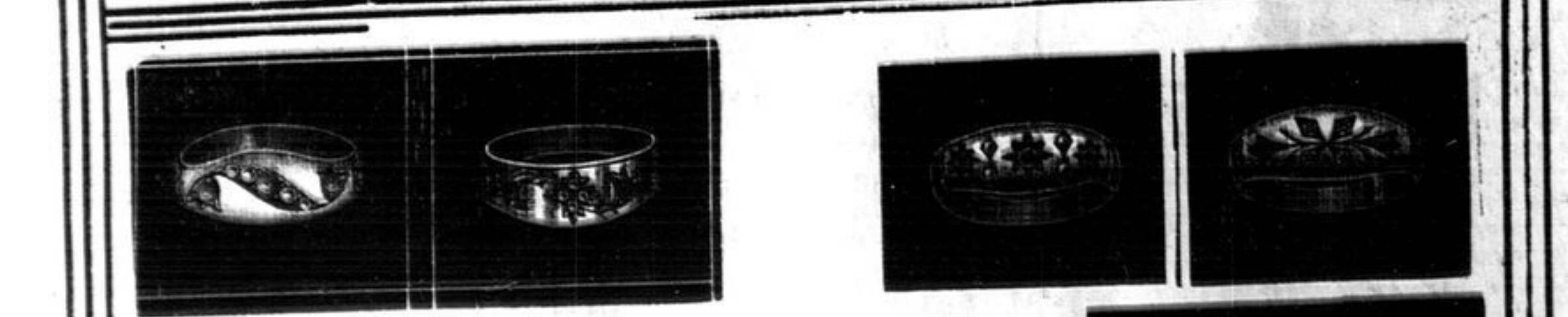
