Mr. Graham did not see any necessity of paying the amount over at present. It could be held to be used as required.

Warden Shaver said this was along the line he indicated in Council the previous day. He felt that the Society was doing a good work, and should be in a position to come and get some money when required.

Mr. Johnston approved of that plan of making the grant. Mr. McFarlane did not see the propriety of making a grant when the Society had funds on hand.

the instructions contained in the resolutions of Council and the matters referred from the June session and beg to recommend as follows:

1. That the salary of the physician to the House of Refuge be increased to \$250 per annum, on and from January 1st, 1907, and that leave be given to include a provision to that effect in an amending by-law. 2. That an allowance of \$900 be paid to the Warden in acknowledgment of his services during the year. 3. That no further grant be made to the Poultry and Pet Stock Association in the year 1906.

4. That the sum of \$100 be granted to the Children's Aid Society, with instructions to the Treasurer to pay the amount when the state of the funds of the Children's Aid Society makes it necessary.

5. That the existing by-law relating to the pedlars be repealed, the fee for a license hereafter be \$40 for one year; with the provision that in the case of applicants who have resided continuously within the county for at least one year prior to the date of the application the amount shall be \$25 for one year, and that leave be given to introduce a by-law to give effect to this recommendation.

Your committee have considered the further documents referred to them, and beg to recommend as follows:

1. That the report of the Bank of Montreal on Treasurer's balance be filed.

2. That the report of the Inspector of Prisons be referred to the Council at the January session.

3. That the communication from T. H. Watson, Esq., Reeve of Mariposa, relative to the equalization of assessment be filed, it having been decided not to press the objection to the values.

4. That no action be taken upon the request of the Auditors of County accounts for additional remuneration.

5. That a report of the Committee of the Council of Halton on the subjects of the Courts and the administration of Justice be filed.

6. That the financial statements of the municipalities of Laxton, Digby and Longford, Emily, Carden, Mariposa, Somerville, Ops, Lindsay, Fenelon and Bobcaygeon, be filed.

7. That the report of the East Victoria Farmers' Institute be filed.

8. That the reports of the Ontario Municipal Association and the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association, be filed.
