COUNTY COUNCIL

incident to and contingent on the birth taking place in the institution. The action was tried on October 8th, by His Honor Judge McMillan and a jury, and resulted in a verdict for the defendant being rendered.

In response to a communication from Messrs. McLaughlin & Peel, Solicitors for the Town of Lindsay, respecting the allegation that the flow from the House of Refuge sewer into the town system of sewerage contributed to the overflow which led to an action for damages being brought against the town by Mr. Samuel Walker, and requesting a conference, a conference was held on September 26th, Mr. James A. Peel, barrister, and Messrs. T. A. Fisher and John O'Reilly, aldermen, representing the town. The Board decided that without prejudice to the existing rights of the county under the agreement with the town in the event of an engineer recommending that the existing difficulty with regard to the flow can be remedied by the construction of a curved connection of the sewer on Sussex street, south, with the Kent street sewer, the Board was prepared to recommend the Council to pay the cost of the curved connection and one-half the charges of the engineer. The new connection has been made by the town on the advice of Mr. George Smith, C.E., and the Board beg your acceptance of their recommendation, and for leave to make the consequent disbursements. The Board have ordered storm win-

dows for the windows on the west and north sides of the House. The need for the storm windows is referred to in the report of the Government Inspector. Your approval is requested.

After a conference with Mr. Nicholas Brady, executor of the Tully estate, on September 26th, respecting the line fence on the north side of the farm, it was agreed that conditional on all the present material of the fence and the stones and rubbish being wholly removed from the line by the owners not later than October 10th, the county would build the fence free of expense to the Tully estate. Your approval is requested.

The Board beg to inform the Council that Mr. and Mrs. Robertson, the keeper and matron, have performed the onerous duties of their respective positions with such efficiency as to merit the commendation of the Board. They have satisfactorily overcome the special difficulties which are inseparable from the initial stages of the work of such an institution. The Board deem it to be their duty to recommend that the salary of the keeper be increased to \$350 per annum, and that the salary of the matron be increased to \$250 per annum, on and from January 1st, 1907.

In the report submitted at the January session, the Board stated that it appeared to them expedient that all information as to the statistics and finances of the House and farm should emanate from the Board through the office of the Clerk and Treasurer, and that in the meantime the letter of the rules and regulations

might have to be somewhat disregarded. The experience gained during the year in which the work has been carried on has made it clear that numerous amendments are desirable, and the Board beg leave to introduce a by-law for enacting new rules and regulations for the government of the institution.

A QUESTION OF PRIVILEGE.
Mr. Patterson rose to a question of privilege. He said that reports had been circulated that he had influenced the Committee on Finance and the Board of Management of the House of Refuge in the action they took against Mr. Hixon in regard to a child born in the House of Refuge. He wished explicitly to deny these reports.

Mr. Staback said any such statements were entirely false as far as the Committee was concerned. Mr. Graham said the Board of the House of Refuge simply did the work on the advice of the County Solicitor, and when it was found he could not act, on the advice of Mr. R. J. McLaughlin, K.C. The recommendation of the Committee on Finance passed at the June session was as follows:

"That the matter relating to the parentage of a child born in the House of Refuge be referred to the Board of Management, with authority and direction to take such steps as they may deem to be necessary in order that justice, may be vindicated."

Mr. Patterson continued Mr. Graham, took no part in influencing the Board. They were guided solely by the direction of the Council on recommendation of solicitors.

Mr. Johnson said Mr. Patterson took no more part than any other member of the Council. Mr. McGee, a member of the Board, understood it to be the wish of the Council to have the Board take the action. He recollected no conversation with Mr. Patterson in regard to the matter. The Judge, in addressing the jury, had said it was the duty of the Council to do what had been done.

Warden Shaver stated that after an investigation had been made and the statement of the mother taken, it was referred to the Solicitor, who advised the action taken. No member of the Council showed any feeling in the matter. No member in Committee dissented. No member at any time attempted to influence him, and if he had it would have been resented. If the Solicitor had not advised as he did nothing would have been done.

Mr. Fairbairn regarded it as his duty to vindicate the character of his colleagues when unjustly attacked. There was nothing whatever in the charge or statement against Mr. Patterson.

Mr. Staback then moved, seconded by Mr. McGee, whereas certain reports are in circulation that Mr. R. J. Patterson, one of the County Councillors for the third division of the County of Victoria, was influential in causing the Committee on Finance and Assessment to recommend the Board of Management of the House of Refuge to enter suit against John Hixon, this motion is

made to contradict such statements. On request of Mr. Graham the yeas and nays were taken:
Yeas—Austin, Elliot, Fairbairn, Graham, Johnson, McFarlane, McGee, McQuade, Staback and the Warden, 10.
Nays—None.

Mr. Bailey had left before the motion was introduced, and Mr. Patterson was excused from voting as the matter related to himself.

BY-LAWS PASSED.

By-laws were passed increasing the salary of the Physician, Keeper and Matron of the House of Refuge to \$250, \$350 and \$250 respectively to take effect Jan. 1st, 1907, fixing the salary and allowances of F. D. Moore, County Police Magistrate, and providing rules and regulations for the House of Refuge.

THANKS TO WARDEN.

The Warden was voted from the chair, and Mr. Graham called to it, and the following resolution carried by an unanimous standing vote:

Moved by A. McFarlane, seconded by George Johnson, that the thanks of this Council be extended to the Warden for his courteous conduct in the chair, and for his excellent and progressive management of the affairs of the County. His duties have been most arduous, and a number of important questions has engaged his attention, and we cannot fail to mark the untiring zeal he has devoted in reference to those questions. It is the sincere wish of this Council that his usefulness may be long continued to the people of this county.

The Warden replied in appreciative terms, and the Council adjourned after singing the National Anthem.

FARM NOTES

Fruit keeps best, says the Country Gentleman, in a temperature just above freezing, in an atmosphere not dry enough to cause shrivelling.

A decrease of \$3,212,609 in Canada's export trade, is shown in the October report. The imports show an increase of \$2,828,000.

It pays to feed the young fowls liberally until well grown. Once stunted they never regain their vigor, even by the most careful feeding.

The cow that fattens easily is seldom a good milker. The function of the dairy cow is to turn feed into milk, not meat.

A total of \$500,800,000 represents the value of poultry products disposed of during 1905 in the United States. Of this amount, \$265,000,000 was for eggs and \$235,800,000 for poultry.

The wholesale price of Manila fibre in New York is 10 to 10 1/2 cents, as compared with 9 1/2 to 9 cents last year. This looks as if under twin will be a little higher in 1907 than it was in 1906.

Crop reports from 71 Provinces of Russia show the yield of wheat and rye to be 9,598,000,000 pounds. Below the average. In many inland Provinces the peasants, weakened by hunger, have taken to their beds for days at a time.

To keep onions through the winter it is necessary for them to be perfectly dry when cribbed; also to be kept in a cool place, (32 degrees), with plenty of ventilation. They should not be piled more than two feet deep.

Frank Tuttle, of Wayne County, New York has an apple orchard of 40 acres, and 1,000 trees, for which he paid \$9,000. This year he refused an offer of \$8,000 for the fruit, also another offer of \$10,000 for orchard and fruit. His crop this year was 30,000 bushels.

The feeding of apple pomace to cows in moderate quantities is recommended by R. N. Mitchell, Country Gentleman. He says last year when he stopped feeding it the cows shrank half a can of milk per day. Considerable importance is laid to not overdoing the feeding of it. Of feeding apples to cows, Country Gentleman says a respectable quantity should not be expected to injure the milk, further they would combine admirably with grain rations.

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
