## An Interesting Church Anniversary

### St. Paul's Church was opened Twenty-One Years Ago The Event Celebrated Last Sunday

The twenty-first anniversary of the opening of St. Paul's church was observed by special services last Sunday, November 25th. Rev. Canon H. C. Dixon, of Toronto, preached excellent sermons morning and evening, which were listened to by large congregations. In the afternoon he addressed the Sunday school. Rev. H. A. Ben-Ollel, of Millbrook, being unavoidably absent. The music at both church services was of a special character. At the morning service the Rector, Rev. C. H. Marsh, made the following statement:

"Twenty-one years ago to-day—on Nov. 25, 1885—St. Paul's church was opened. The preachers on the occasion were the present Bishop of Toronto, Right Rev. Dr. Sweatman, in the morning; in the afternoon, Dr. Ray, of Cobourg, and in the evening, Rev. Canon Dumoulin, now Bishop of Niagara. Of the other clergy present Canon O'Meara, Port Hope; Rural Dean Allan (afterwards Archdeacon of Millbrook), F. W. Bayley-Jones and J. E. Cooper, of Cambray have passed away. The then incumbent, Rev. S. Weston Jones, has been made Archdeacon of Prince Edward Island; Rev. G. E. Lloyd, Archdeacon of Saskatchewan; Revs. J. Hart and J. Farncomb have been appointed to arishes in Toronto; Rev. E. Daniels to Port Hope; Rev. W. H. French to Uxbridge.

"The Churchwardens at the time of opening were Adam Hudspeth and Robt. Bryans, one of whom is still with us and acting in the same capacity. Of the six members of the Building Committee only two—Rev. S. Weston-Jones and Robt. Bryans—are still living; Messrs. Wm. Grace, David Brown, Thos. Walters and A. Hudspeth have passed to the other here; the Finance committee and the Treasurer—Messrs. J. H. Knight, C. D. Barr, Dr. Burrows, J. H. Sootheran and G. H. Hopkins—are still with us.

"Of the 85 first subscribers to the building fund 44 are still alive and 41 are gone. The cost of the church ground and building was \$19,082.70. Since then the school house and furnishing cost between \$4,000 and \$5,000, the new organ and church room of last year over \$4,000, making with other things a total expenditure of \$30,000 on capital account. The mortgage indebtedness is \$6,500, which I trust will be materially reduced by to-day's contributions."

A social reunion was held on Monday evening in the school room. The Rector, Rev. C. H. Marsh, opened with prayer, and expressed his thankfulness for such a large attendance on an unfavorable night. Mr. Geo. A. Ilne, the people's warden, reported the collections of \$980 on Sunday. During the evening this was augmented to \$1,000. Mr. Robert Bryans, Rector's Warden, who held that position when the church was built, thanked the congregation for their liberality. Rev. Canon Creighton, now of Lindsay, gave an interesting sketch of the history of the church and of old cathedrals. Rev. Rural Dean Creighton, of Bobcaygeon, made a short address, and there were also on the program: Instrumental, Miss Leary; solo, Mrs. C. H. Marsh; reading, Miss Alda Bryans; solo, Miss F. Adams; violin solo, Master Gordon Dingle, accompanied by Miss Muriel Dingle; solo, Mr. W. Perkins. A vote of thanks was passed to Rev. Canon Dixon for his sermons, and refreshments were served.

### Water Commissioners

The regular meeting of the Board of Water Commissioners was held on Monday afternoon. Present, Messrs. J. D. Flavell, Chairman, Brady, McNeillie and Mayor Vrooman.

Mr. G. H. Wilson, of the Post, appeared before the Commission in regard to having one meter put in his new building on William street.

Chairman Flavell favored consideration, and after some informal discussion the matter was left in abeyance until the building was completed, when the Commissioners will visit the building and see what can be done to meet Mr. Wilson.

The chairman said that it was a matter for the Council to deal with. Superintendent Hammond stated that the distance was about 400 feet.

A meeting of the Board of the Home for the Aged Society and representative citizens named at the annual meeting to consult with the Board as to disposition of surplus of some \$2,700 was held in the Town Hall on Tuesday evening, Mr. Thos. Stewart, the President, in the chair. Mrs. H. G. Whiteside, Mrs. F. Crandell, Mrs. George Mills, Mrs. B. J. Gough, Mrs. G. A. Milne, Mrs. R. Spratt, Mrs. E. E. Sharpe, Messrs. R. Spratt, Conley, John Kelley, W. McWatters, Dr. White, James Graham, J. D. Flavell, R. Kyle, J. R. McNeillie, Mayor Vrooman, G. F. Blackwell, Ald. Fisher, Duncan Ray, Ald. Eyles, Robert Bryans, F. C. Taylor, Ald. Rea, J. P. Donald, W. M. Robson, I. E. Weldon, L. R. Knight and F. Crandell spoke on the subject, and Rev. J. Wallace sent a letter expressing his views.

Briefly put the different views were to use the money for a park, to keep the principal and use interest for charity, to take part of it for a cottage shelter for the Children's Aid Society, to endow a bed or build a cottage at the Gravenhurst Sanatorium for consumptives, to build a permanent isolation hospital, to build temporary isolation hospitals.

The chairman assured the meeting that the Board would give due consideration to the suggestions, and perhaps call another meeting before coming to a decision.
