sider his determination. Concerning Mr. Preston the first minister admitted that the Commissioner had acted

improperly and that by quarrelling with his associates he had showed himself unsuitable for his office. So he had to be removed, but it was thought well to give him another office and this had been done.

Vigorous and aggressive speeches in the opposition side followed from Hon. George E. Foster, Mr. W. F. McLean, Mr. Chisholm and Sproule. Mr. Bourassa, Independent Liberal, then announced that he had something to say in reply to an attack made upon him by Mr. Aylesworth, Minister of Justice, but would defer his statement until Monday when he hoped the Minister would be present.

### NOTHING DONE BY THE SENATE.

The death of Senator Kerr, of Cobourg, Ontario, makes the sixth vacancy in that chamber. Senator Vidal, the eminent and greatly respected temperance legislator, who died this month at the age of eighty-seven, was the only Conservative of those whose seats are vacated. None of the measures promised by the Government will be introduced in the Senate, which will, therefore, have to adjourn for want of something to do until the Tariff Bill has been got out of the way of the House of Commons.

go west to speculate, some to Alberta, and some to British Columbia.

I found the weather, except May, which was cold and windy, to be fine, no frost till October. September is the threshing month. It is all done in the open, few men, stack, the plan is the machine with 13 teams and 20 men handle the stooks, fire and water. The gang board and sleep in a portable dining car. A day's work is from 1 1/2 to 3 thousand bushels, at 7c. for oats, 9 for wheat. Ten teams draw grain to granary at \$4.50 per day. This is done by farmers. They work long hours and steady, except when a jack rabbit is started out by a greyhound, which is always on hand. He is a stern boss who can hold his men on duty when this race is on. Had Solomon seen a Saskatchewan rabbit run for its life it would have had precedence in Holy Writ to that of the goat as one of the things that called forth his admiration for going well.

As for Oxbow, it is a thriving town built on a curve of the Souris River, in shape like the oxbow, hence its name. Fifteen miles south is Uncle Sam's land. In general the land is rolling and of a gritty nature, a good feature for wheat. Instead of streams of fish there are pools of motionless water covered with duck, quite tame till shooting season. Spools of thread for fishing lines and banded pins for hooks are meaningless poetry for the Saskatchewan youth.

To tell of all who have done well from our part would be too much. All are jubilant over prospects. Jas. Rehile, who left four years ago with a limited amount of money, and could sell for a big profit. I expect to be down next month, and to tell of the chances that are here for the man who is coming will be the pleasure of yours truly.

### Lakefield Local Option By-law Sustained

At Osgoode Hall, Toronto, on Wednesday, November 21, before Chief Justice Meredith in single court.—D. O. Cameron and O. A. Langley (Lakefield) for Leahy, a ratepayer, moved to quash by-law No. 415 of the village of Lakefield, a by-law to prohibit the sale of liquor in the village of Lakefield, W. E. Raney, for the village corporation, contra. The principal objections relied on were that the by-law had not been posted up in the four most conspicuous places in the village, nor in large type; that some five tenants had voted who had no right to, and that a clergyman and others had promised that if the by-law were carried people had between \$6,000 and \$7,000 already subscribed, and sufficient more money promised to bring the amount up to \$14,000, to be expended in the erection of a large public building, to be used as a temperance hotel and to contain reading and sitting rooms, which would be provided with literature and games for the use of the public free of charge, and in connection with which temperance hotel sheds and stables would be built, and the use of such sheds would be free, and that such statements constituted bribery within the meaning of the act. Held, that the objections fail; that nothing was specified in the act as to size of type; that it was sworn that the by-law was conspicuously posted in six different places; that the number of tenants who wrongfully voted was not large enough to destroy the ma-

majority even if all voted for the by-law, as to which no statement is made; that the statements as to temperance hotel did not constitute bribery within the meaning of the act. Motion must be dismissed with costs.

### Township of Ops and Omeme Road

LIKELIHOOD OF CONSIDERABLE LITIGATION BETWEEN THE CORPORATION AND FARMERS IN REGARD TO THE MATTER.

There will probably be an interesting amount of litigation between the township of Ops and a number of the farmers in regard to the short portion of the Omeme road crossing the 8th and 9th concessions. For a number of years it appears to have been the understanding that this road should be closed and no roadwork was done upon it, the ordinary road allowances being considered quite sufficient, without this piece of forced or cross country road that did not shorten the distance materially. It had also a dangerous railway crossing on it.

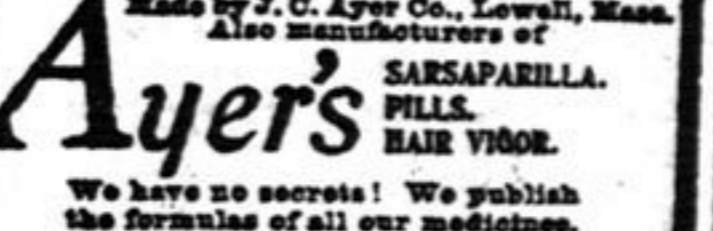
The council of the year 1905 passed a by-law closing the road and providing for its conveyance to the farmers along the road and deeds had been executed and delivered before the end of that year to Michael Fox, W. I. Reid and R. H. Reid and the consideration paid to the township. The council of 1906 decided to reverse this policy and open the road again, and they passed a by-law for that purpose and the farmers who had received deeds for their property were not compensated and even the money paid by them was not returned. They consequently took proceedings under the Municipal Act to compel the township to make a settlement and the matter came on before Judge Harding on the 24th inst., on application for the appointment of arbitrators. The township have met this by commencing an action in the High Court to set aside its own by-laws and deeds that had been given the farmers. The Judge has adjourned the application to appoint arbitrators until the action in the High Court is disposed of. Present indications are that there will be not a little law before the matter is settled.

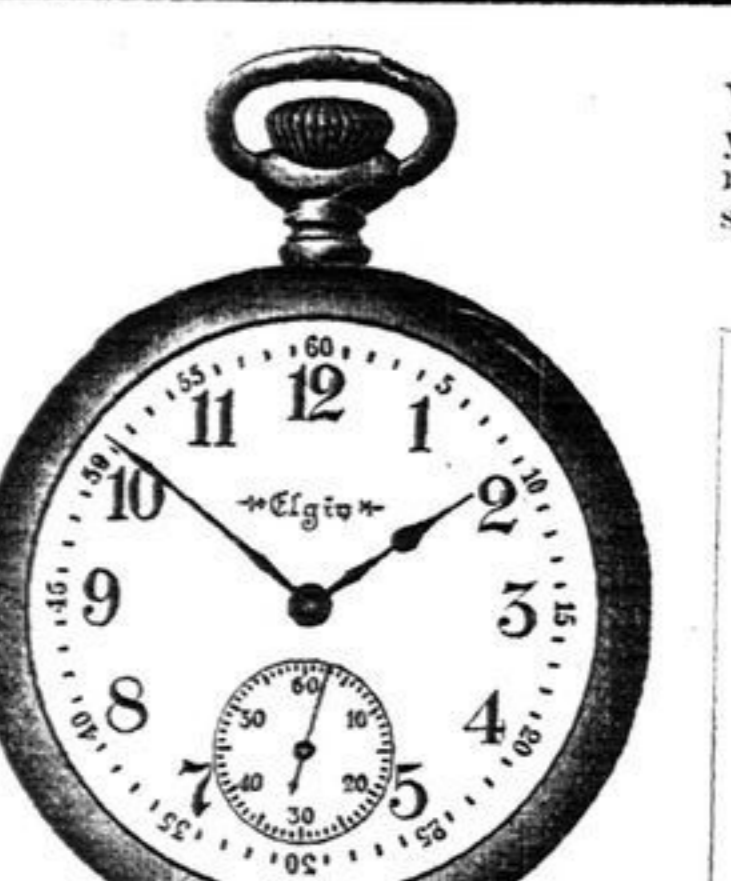
