The new Peterborough County House of Refuge will be formally opened about the latter end of next month. It is a handsome building, constructed on thoroughly modern lines...

They could easily make Cobourg by going through Garden Hill, and at the same time pass through an almost level valley from Kirby or Leskarud through the prosperous villages of Kendal, Elizabethville, Garden Hill, Campbellcroft and Bowdley.

Lindsay Student Assaulted in Toronto

Globe of Saturday: "Mr. C. H. McAlpine, a second year arts man, who comes from Lindsay, went out from the University of Toronto on Thursday night and while posting a letter two men grabbed him and demanded his money. One of the highwaymen pointed a revolver at him and told him to keep quiet or there would be somebody shot. McAlpine wrenched himself away and ran to the university buildings, where he secured assistance, but not before his assailants had fled. Frank Blackhall was about the grounds; and the police say that he stayed in the building all night. Detective Anderson went out last night in search of the highwaymen, and finding Blackhall in the University again placed him under arrest. A revolver was found on him. Blackhall says he lives at 26 Division street." Mr. McAlpine is a son of Dr. McAlpine, of this town.

APPOINTMENT OF THREE NEW TEACHERS

VACANCIES ON THE COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE AND PUBLIC SCHOOL STAFF FILLED AT SPECIAL MEETING OF BOARD

A special meeting of the Board of Education was held on Monday evening to consider applications for vacancies on the Public school and Collegiate Institute staff.

For teacher of Part Second in the Public schools, at \$400, there were 52 applications. Principal Broderick had made a list of six, any of whom, he thought, would be competent.

Miss Kate S. Thompson, who holds a second-class professional certificate and has taught nine years in the Deseronto Central school, was chosen. She is recommended by Principal Luck, of that school, and Inspector J. Johnston, of South Hastings.

The second choice is Miss Mildred Hallett, who holds a first-class professional certificate, and has taught two years in Orillia, besides having other experience. She is recommended by the Principal, Inspector Day, and ex-Inspector Morgan, of East Simcoe. She formerly resided in Lindsay.

For classical master of the Collegiate Institute at an initial salary of \$1,200, there were seventeen applicants. Mr. John F. McDonald, of Barrie, was selected. He is an honor graduate of Queen's University, Kingston, was tutor in classics in the University for two years, classical master at Carleton Place for four years, and at Barrie since vacation. Rev. J. Wallace, who knows him, regards him as a first-class man for the position.

The second choice is Mr. A. W. Morris, assistant teacher in classics in Hamilton Collegiate Institute. He is an honor graduate of Toronto, and has taught in the Kemptville High School.

For junior general assistant at \$800 there were twelve applications.

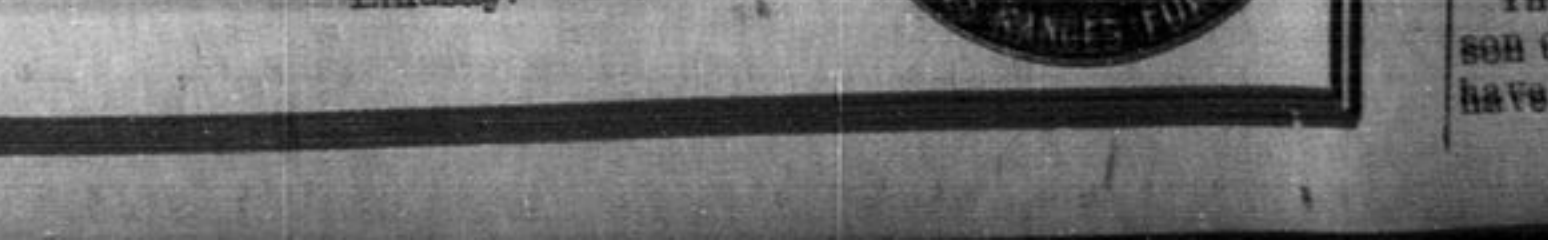
