### Muskrat Pelts Seized near **Omemee and Fines** Imposed\*

Deputy Game Warden Percy Fitzgerald, of Peterborough, seized number of muskrat skins in Emily township last week, one report says about a hundred. The open season for taking the muskrat is between January 1st and May 1st, so that two parties who were in possession of the skins had clearly broken the game aws. A man in Omemee had several skins which he gave up to the Game Warden, and paid a fine: The second offender, an Indian

ing about four miles northeast memee, had a large number muskrat pelts in his possession, and was brought before County Police Magistrate F. D. Moore, of Lindsay. He produced what had been represented to him by some white men a permit to kill muskrats, but which n fact, gave him no such authority. The Indian, who could not read, stated that the document had been explained to him as giving him this authority. He also pleaded that his living was dependent upon getting the carcasses of the muskrats for food. The Magistrate let the Indian off with the lowest fine, \$5 and costs but warned him that if he appeared again he would not be given such
