WOMAN, SUPPOSED TO BE THE MOTHER, CARRIES OFF THE CHILD. ATTEMPT TO RECOVER YOUNGSTER NOW BEING MADE.

On Thursday last Dorothy Marion, the eight-year-old adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Marion, was taken from the school at noon by a woman supposed now to be the mother of the child.

The Marions believe they had legally adopted the child, and that they thus had the only claim on it. Accordingly a message was sent to Blackwater for the arrest of the woman.

After endeavoring to secure the arrest of the woman at Peterboro, Mr. Marion went on to Montreal. Chief Vincent is also in Montreal. The woman and child have been located there, but the legal proceedings have not yet sufficiently advanced to allow of the return of the child to its foster parents.

The child in the case is a pretty youngster, and has been with Mr. and Mrs. Marion for the past three or four years.

Much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Marion, as they had a great affection for the youngster, and feel the temporary loss very severely.
