## HIGH COURT OF JUSTICE

### FOUR INTERESTING CASES BEFORE CHANCELLOR SIR JOHN BOYD.

The following is a resume of the cases before Chancellor Sir John Boyd at the High Court (non-jury) sittings here last week:-

#### OPS VS. FOX & REID.

This is the Omemee road case. In July 1905 the council passed a by-law closing part of the Omemee road across the eighth and ninth concessions. Mrs. Moore took proceedings to quash the same, and the council repealed the by-law, and again on the 15th of December, 1905, passed another by-law authorizing the closing of the same, and the conveying of the different parts to adjoining proprietors. Great opposition was made by all the residents in the Reaboro section with the result that Mr. Jackson, the Reeve, and several of the councillors were defeated, and a new council elected opposed to the closing of the road, but in the meantime the council held a hurried meeting on the 20th December, and executed the deeds, and Messrs. Fox and Reid took theirs and claimed to be the owners of the road. The other five parties refused to take their deeds as they desired to keep the road open. The new council tried to settle the matter but Messrs. Fox and Reid refused to take their money back and give up the deeds. The new council then passed a by-law re-opening the road and Fox and Reid took proceedings against the council claiming \$2500 compensation for opening the road. They claimed that the road having been legally closed the re-opening of the road gave them the same right to damages as if no road had ever been there, and the judge held the deed was binding upon him. Thereupon the council brought this action to have the by-law and deeds set aside, on the ground that they were not passed in the public interest, but in the interest of Messrs. Fox and Reid, and were otherwise technically defective. During the progress of the case the chancellor expressed the opinion that Messrs. Fox and Reid were not entitled to more than the one hundred dollars paid by them to the council, and which the council offered to refund, but that while the council from time to time were different still the corporation was the same, and as the plaintiffs had caused the difficulty by passing the by-law they should pay the costs, and judgment was given declaring the by-law invalid and setting aside the deeds to Fox and Reid and arbitration proceedings, the township to repay them the \$100 and costs.

#### SHEFFEE VS. SHEFFEE.

This was a case from Minden township. Samuel Sheffee agreed to keep his father until death in return for a deed for the farm occupied. A brother Robert was given a mortgage for an interest in the estate, but the father claimed that the agreement to support him had not been fulfilled. Action was accordingly taken to have the deed set aside. Judgment was given for the father, each party to pay their own cost. McLaughlin Peel & Fulton for defendant, and Moore & Jackson for plaintiffs.

#### BOLDT VS. BOLDT.

This was an action for alimony. The plaintiff was unable to bear the strain in the witness box and fainting. Adjournment was made, but the plaintiff still continued very ill. The case was further adjourned to the spring assizes, unless in the meantime the parties agree to have the evidence taken by Judge Harding. McLaughlin, Peel & Fulton for the plaintiff, Moore & Jackson, for defendant.

#### BREAULT VS. TOWN OF LINDSAY

This was an action for damages by Mrs. Breault, of Cobocok, for injuries received through falling on an alleged defective sidewalk on Sussex street, north. Evidence was heard, and the arguments of counsel on both sides listened to. Judgment was reserved on Tuesday, but later was announced as in favor of the town. It was held that there was no evidence of a defective condition existing long enough or in conspicuous manner so as to give proper notice to the defendant corporation as to action to have the by-law and deeds set aside, on the ground that they with great interest by many towns-people and the outcome will be pleasing to many. There was much difference of opinion in the evidence on some minor points.

## Foul Fowl Thievery

On Monday evening, Nov. 18th, W. Nelligan, who was at Michael Garry's, South Ops, saw three men running off with chickens. Chase was made and three of the birds with necks wrung were dropped in the flight. About 30 birds, however, were secured in this haul by the marauders.

The same evening, John J. Pogue, South Ops, lost three geese, and Mr. Joe Hall had a quantity of potatoes stolen.

Mrs. T. McCabe on the same evening had 11 geese stolen.

No clue as to the identity of the marauders has been secured as yet, but efforts are being made to trace the guilty parties, and the tracks are said to be getting warm.

## Removed to House of Refuge

On Monday, 25th inst., a woman named Mrs. Phillips, from the vicinity of Kinmount, was removed from a deplorable condition and taken to the County House of Refuge, where she has been admitted as an inmate. The woman has been a helpless invalid for several years, and her family of five children has received very little care or attention.

For some time past efforts have been made by residents of Kinmount and vicinity to have Mrs. Phillips properly cared for, but as her affliction was great and her case somewhat out of the ordinary state of affairs, progress was made very slowly.

Three of her children are wards of the Provincial C. A. Society, having become such by order of Police Magistrate Wm. Fielding, of Haliburton county.

The order for the removal of Mrs. Phillip and her daughter from their destitute condition was carried out by the secretary of the C. A. Society, Mrs. Sharpe, of Lindsay.
