THINKS IT IS HER BROTHER.

Mrs. R. Moore, Colborne-st., was reading in The Watchman an account of a railway wreck near Rochester on the New York Central lines, when she came across the name, Frank Chapman, the assistant trainmaster, who received fatal injuries and subsequently died. It suddenly struck Mrs. Moore that this man was her brother from whom she has not heard from for five years, and enquiries are being made to find out if this is the case.
Mrs. Moore states that her brother, Arthur Chapman, visited in this vicinity about eight or nine years ago and the last she heard of him was about five years ago. He went out west, but was of a roving disposition, and may have come back east and taken up railroading. He was a young man of about twenty-eight or thirty years of age.
While there may be others of the same name, Mrs. Moore feels that the victim of the accident was her brother.
The accident in which Chapman was killed occurred near Rochester and was a rear-end collision. The engineer was thrown into the fire box and was roasted alive and Chapman was buried under the wreckage and badly burned. He died when he was taken out.

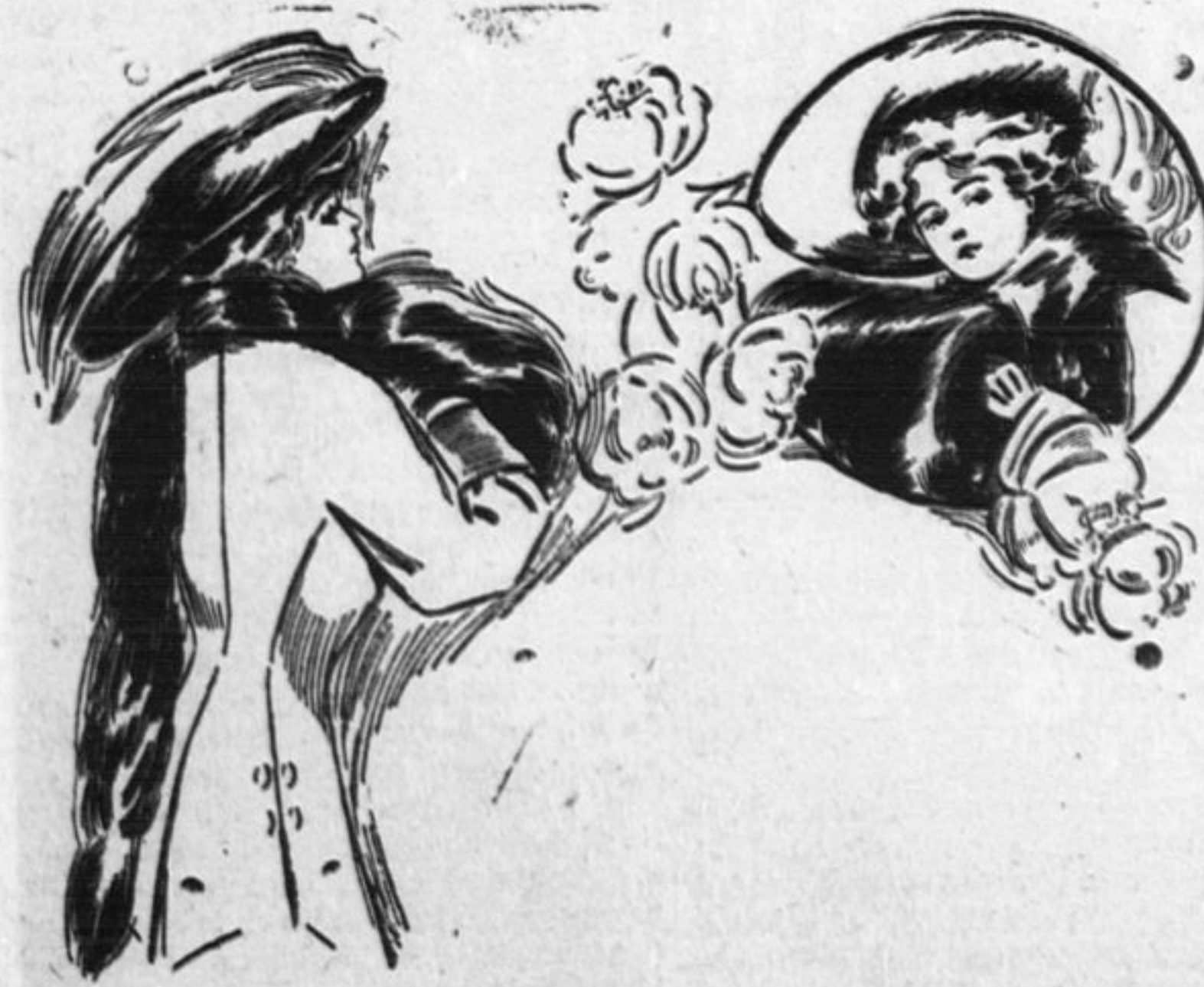
