OPS COUNCIL

Members all present. Mr. William Reeds applied to have redress re water turned on his place from Peter Carlin's place across the road. On motion of Messrs. Deyell and O'Loughlin, Reeve Hawkins and Coun. Best were appointed to view the place and try to have the trouble arranged between the parties concerned.

Mr. Calvert wished to borrow \$100 for tile drainage. On motion of Messrs. Deyell and Hickson Mr. Robert Reeds was appointed inspector of tile drainage for that part of Ops east of the Scugog river, and Mr. Calvert was instructed to have his work inspected by Mr. Reeds before the loan could be made.

Mr. W. H. Wilson asked for bonus for wire fence he had built. Mr. Hawkins, com. for that division, said his appropriation money was exhausted, and council thought it better before granting the bonus from the general fund to wait till the December meeting and see if the state of the treasury would warrant so doing.

Mr. John Robinson asked for a grant toward putting in tile, where he claimed he had been imposed on by the engineers' award. Council thought it unwise to interfere with award of the engineer, and as said drainage was of no benefit to the roadway, it was decided to take no action.

Mr. Wm. Jones complained against the engineer's award in the Kennedy-Jones drain. Council told Mr. Jones that his only course for redress would be a new examination by an engineer, according to the ditches and watercourses act.

A by-law to prohibit the use of the rifle on or within 500 yards of the Scugog river in Ops township, and the shotgun on or within 70 yards of said river except at game birds in open season, was passed, signed and sealed, as by-law No. 688.

Moved by Mr. Deyell, seconded by Mr. O'Loughlin, that the Grand Trunk Railway Co. be asked to put a light at O'Halloran's crossing on the boundary between Ops and Lindsay, as the said crossing is very dangerous to after-night traffic, being in a hollow excavated by the said Railway Co.

The council thought it unfair that the township should have to pay the interest on the \$200 advanced to School Section No. 10, Ops, last mid-summer, and on motion of Messrs. Hickson and Best the treasurer was instructed to charge the said section interest at 5 per cent. for five months.

A communication re an old agreement between the township and Mr. Wm. Bryans concerning the maintenance of a drain on Mr. Bryans' place, was laid before the council, and on motion of Messrs. O'Loughlin and Deyell, Mr. Best was appointed to look into the matter.

On motion of Messrs. Best and O'Loughlin the following accounts were passed: Watchman-Warder, for printing and advertising \$54.25; Thos. Waldon, for tile and work on drain, \$6.60; Wesley Waldon, for 232 loads gravel at 15c, \$34.80; Thomas Reeds, for 304 loads gravel, at 15c, \$45.60; Samuel Jemison, as per interim order, \$10.50; Walter Reeds, do, \$11.75; William Moore, do, \$8.05; Thos. H. Reeds, do, \$8.05; J. E. McDaniel, do, \$19.25; S. J. Fox, M.P.P., for tile, \$2.03; local selectors of jurors, \$16; Joseph Costello, for burying a nuisance \$1.50; J. R. McNeillie, for use of stone crusher, \$124; John McCrae, for work on tile moulds, \$2.45.

On motion of Messrs. O'Loughlin and Hickson, council adjourned to meet Dec. 15th, 1909. W. E. AGNEW, Clerk.
