THREAT AGAINST J. C. EATON

Alleged "Black Hand" Letter Demands Money or Life

Toronto, Oct. 27. — The perpetra-
tor of one of the most daring at-
tempts at extortion that the Toron-
to police have had to deal with in
many years was run to earth yester-
day afternoon when James E.
McCauley, an amateur "Black Hand-
er," was captured in the Colborne-
st. doorway of the King Edward
Hotel. McCauley's "Black Hand"
against Mr. John C. Eaton, Presi-
dent of the T. Eaton Co. Limited,
and the assistance given the police
by Mr. Eaton in entrapping the
man, enabled the police to effect his
arrest.

DETECTIVES WAITED
For over two hours detectives lay
in hiding in the lavatory of the
hotel, waiting until the author of
the "Black Hand" letters came to
secure the money left there as a
bait. When the trap was sprung
McCauley was followed to the Col-
borne-st. entrance where the detec-
tives pounced upon him, and after
a warm struggle got the handcuffs
on him.

A remarkable feature of the case
is that the two hundred dollars used
as a bait has mysteriously disap-
peared. McCauley, in a confession
made to the police two hours after
he had been taken to the detective
offices, said that in ve excitement
attending his capture he had pulled
the roll of money from his pocket
and dropped it on the ground. So
far no trace of it has been found.

"BLACK HAND" THREATS
On Monday, while at breakfast,
Mr. Eaton found among his mail a
King Edward Hotel envelope with
his name pencilled in a large irreg-
ular hand. Opening it he found the
following disquieting letter:
"Mr. Eaton,—By the statutes of
our organization, I swear by the
holy deity and saint to demand and
receive \$200 from you or ruin your
household and family or yourself by
shooting the first one handy or dy-
amiting your home or yacht when
your family are on board. So help-
ing me god, if you don't give us the
money or tell the police who makes
trouble we stay in this town till
we get \$5000. We give you week to
get ready—put it next Wednesday in
closet of King Edward Hotel in the
southeast corner one behind a loose
fired of ventilator pipe about two
o'clock.

Black Hand Society
MR. EATON ACTS
Mr. Eaton went at once to the
police. To Sergeant of Police

Detectives Mackie he confided his
suspicion that two Italians employ-
ed in the lavatory of the King Ed-
ward Hotel were responsible for the
letter. He had been there on Sat-
urday and had noticed the two
men. The detective department at
once got to work and a plan was
evolved by which the "Black-
handers" could be caught.

GOOD MONEY USED
It was arranged that Mr. Eaton
should go to the hotel on the date
mentioned in the letter and leave
two hundred dollars. The detectives
proposed to use a roll of counterfeit
money in their profession but Mr.
Eaton preferred to supply good cur-
rency on the grounds that if the
plans of the police for entrapping the
man went astray and he found
that he had been fooled with worth-
less paper he might wreck his ven-
geance upon the members of Mr.
Eaton's family.

USED MARKED MONEY
Twenty ten-dollar bills were ac-
cordingly carefully marked and the
numbers taken. Mr. Eaton then went
to the hotel and left the money in
the place described in the letter. In
the lavatory across the aisle a pri-
vate detective was placed, and fur-
ther along another. It was arrang-
ed that one detective should follow
every man who entered that part of
the lavatory, while the other ascer-
tained whether the money was mis-
sing or not. For over two hours the
two worked on this plan half a
dozen men being under observation
during that time.

GETS THE MONEY
Shortly after 4 o'clock McCauley
entered the lavatory, and a few mo-
ments after he left it the signal was
given that the money was gone.
McCauley got as far as the Col-
borne-st. door of the hotel, when
Detectives McKinney, and House De-
tective Smith caught him.

Mink and Muskrat Cannot go Alone

"When the mink puts on his
winter coat he hardly takes it off
before Christmas," observed Super-
intendent Tinsley, of the Game and
Fisheries Department, when asked for
his view on the request of fur deal-
ers and manufacturers to have the
season open on November 1st in-
stead of December 1st, because in
November the fur was best.

Mr. Tinsley stated that up to last
year there was no close season for
mink, but too many were being kill-
ed. Another reason for imposing
restrictions was that farmers' sons
were setting traps and catching
muskrat, giving the excuse that
they were trying to catch mink.
"But when we found 70 or 80 musk-
rat skins in their houses to one
mink, we could only consider this as
strong proof of design in the trap-
ping.

"The reason why the mink were
not protected before was that they
are destructive little brutes," said
Mr. Tinsley.

While declining to express an opi-
nion as to whether the law would be
changed, he said that no alteration
could be made until the legislature
met in the winter as no provision
was made for revising this law by
Order-in-Council.
