Typhoid Fever Epidemic—Orono Not at all to Blame

Bowmanville News: Orono is not responsible for all the typhoid in Toronto, Peterboro, Port Hope, Bowmanville, Oshawa and other places, as the flare headlines in the Globe would lead one to believe. It is well known that typhoid was quite prevalent in some of these places long before it was heard of in Orono. The death list will run about 1 half the number reported in the Peterboro and Toronto papers. The Globe's "pathetic feature" in its Saturday issue outlined from a C.N.R. man loses some of its pathos, fortunately, when we know that only one of the Fowler brothers—William—succumbed. James is reported convalescing. Typhoid, until now, has been practically unknown in Orono. In fifteen years we have not known of one case originating here. Odd cases have occurred where a person came home from a visit with typhoid, but it went no farther than one house. This looks as though it was pretty well looked after.

In connection with this outbreak, take into account our moving population. Men of all classes, some not the best, have been coming and going all the time. The poorer the class the shorter the stay—our hotel and other places of accommodation have had to do with these people. A fellow not very anxious to work has been known to size up the job, stop for dinner, and decamp, if not entirely suited. Railroad camps have such characters to deal with the same as other places. We will not attempt to point to the starting place of infection, but this condition must be considered.

More About That \$750,000 Fortune

The Hobeys' independent prints additional facts in regard to the fortune story from North Victoria, as follows:

The Devitt settlement is very much stirred over a reported incident that may possibly be coming to light. The Devitt: A party of surveyors from Ottawa are putting up a tower from which they make observations at night and flashlight signals is other towers situated on high lands. There is one on the Harvey Railway Survey and another in Mariposa. The party is in the employ of the Ottawa Department making a geodetic survey of the Province for the purpose of getting a perfectly accurate astronomical map showing the Magnetic Declination.

Mr. Douglas is the head of the party and the story is that before leaving Ottawa he heard of inquiries having been sent out from Scotland Yard, London, for a Devitt family. Col. Sam Hughes heard of the story so it is said, and told Douglas that there were Devitts in his neighborhood, and if he was going into Verulam he might make inquiries. The story is that a Mr. Devitt, of Australia, went out to South Africa with the Australian contingent during the African war. He was wounded and died a few months after. He was an only son and possessed of considerable property, and left a will devising the landed properties to relatives or his mother, while other property amounting to \$750,000 he left to the nearest heir on his father's side of the family. Mr. Thos Devitt had a brother who went to Australia, and of whom he had not heard for many years.
