Government Report on Canadian Crops

The Census Office at Ottawa issues to-day a bulletin on the crops of Canada, as prepared from reports made up to the end of October. A copy was received by the Warder and is appended.

The closing months of the year give good reports for nearly all of the field crops of the Dominion. Potatoes alone indicate partial failure, and in all the provinces there are complaints of rot in the fields and in the heaps for winter storage. The area is 508,232 acres and the estimated yield 71,648,600 bushels being an average of about 142 bushels per acre, which is nearly uniform for all the provinces.
