Toronto Live Stock.
TORONTO, Nov. 15.—The railways reported 175 carloads of live stock at the City Market, consisting of 3230 cattle, 807 hogs, 1856 sheep and lambs and 105 calves.

Exporters.
No export sales were on sale, consequently there were none sold at 36.25 per cwt. Thomas Connor reported to the market that he got about half a load of export hogs, 1500 to 1900 lbs. each, at 4 to 5 per cwt.

Butchers.
Geo. Rowntree bought during the two days 600 cattle for the Harris Abattoir Company—buyers' steers and heifers, \$4.50 to \$5.00; cows, \$4.50 to \$4.75; bulls, \$4.50 to \$4.70.

Stockers and Feeders.
Stockers and feeders were slow of sale compared with a week ago, and sold fully 5c to 8c per cwt. lower. Cattle that were selling for \$5.00 and \$5.40 two weeks ago sold to-day at \$4 to \$5.10.

Stockers were quoted at \$4.50 to \$4.75 for the first time this season.

Milkers and Springers.
Trade in milkers and springers is still good, but not quite as brisk to-day as it has been. Prices ranged at from \$50 to \$55 each, and one sold at as low as \$40.

Veal Calves.
One hundred and five calves, the majority of which were a skimmy lot at best, sold at \$8 to \$7.50 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs.
Wesley Dunn, who is the heaviest buyer of sheep and lambs at all times and seasons of the year, quoted sheep, ewes, at \$4.50 per cwt., and rams at \$4 to \$4.50 per cwt.; lambs at \$4 to \$4.50, which shows that there was not much change in prices, but the market was weak at these quotations.

Not many hogs were reported on sale, and there seemed to be little enquiry for them. Harris reported 47 for select, fed and watered, and 47 for country points, for hogs, f.o.b. cars at country points.
