### Four Awaiting Execution For Murder

One woman and three men are under sentence of death in the county jails of Ontario.

The first to die, if the extreme penalty is enacted will be Robert Parker, the aged Hastings county murderer. The date of his execution has been placed for December 3rd.

Thomas McNulty and his paramour Mary Dolan, the convicted Upergove murderers, will, if the vigorous efforts of their attorneys fail, be hanged on December 14th.

The execution of Rufus Weedmark, the Smith's Falls wife murderer, has also been set for the same day in Perth jail, and if clemency is not obtained, he will die the same date, December 14th.

In these cases five convictions were secured and three were sent over to the Spring Assizes, James Gorham, of Peterboro, charged with matricide was convicted, but not sentenced, owing to a strong recommendation of the jury for mercy. He will probably be given life imprisonment.

### BARS NEED NOT CLOSE

Toronto, Nov. 15.—According to a recent amendment to the License Act all bar rooms are ordered to be kept closed on Christmas Day. The amendment, however, makes no provision if Christmas is observed on any other day than December 25. This year Christmas will fall on a Sunday, and the holiday will be generally observed on Saturday, December 24, or Monday, December 26. In view of the fact that hotelkeepers consider that it will be unfair to them if they are compelled to close their bars on that day, the matter was brought to the notice of Mr. Eudo Saunders, chief officer of the License Department, who stated that it would not be necessary for hotelmen to close their doors on that day.

"The law says," he went on to say "that Christmas shall be a holiday, but it makes no provision for any other day than the 25th of December. So, therefore, as the holiday this year comes on Monday, the hotelkeepers will be able to keep open for business."

### BURNT OUT OF HOME

An alarm was sent into the fire hall early Tuesday by call boy Pearson of the G.T.R. station, who was calling Mr. Gassien in the south ward. The boy noticed a fire in Prof. West's kitchen, who lives next door. Pearson went to the house and woke the family, who knew nothing of the fire at the time, and then rang the alarm from box 5. It was probably caused by sparks falling from the kitchen stove. The house is a very high building, formerly owned by the late Mr. Guiry and built to be used as an hotel on Glenelg-st.

The fire had got a considerable start on the brigade when they reached it. Both teams worked well. The barn filled with bales of excellent and the front part of the house were saved, although damaged by water. It is said that about \$800 worth of furniture in the house was mostly saved.

### Sunday School—The Lesson For To-Morrow

Lesson VIII.—Fourth Quarter, For Nov. 20, 1910.

### THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Matt. xxvii, 36-55. Memory Verses, 38, 39—Golden Text, Matt. xxvii, 45—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

It may have been, as some think, not far from midnight when Jesus went forth with His disciples over the brook Kedron on His way to Gethsemane. We think of another night which in some small measure foreshadowed this one, when the king of Israel fled for his life across this same brook, accompanied by a few faithful followers, because of the rebellion of his son Absalom. In our lesson we see the true King of Israel about to be put to death by His firstborn (Ex. iv, 22) and about to enter into an agony the like of which was never before seen by men or angels on this earth. Possibly He had spoken the words of John xv and xvi on His way to the garden and had prayed the prayer of chapter xvii after reaching the garden. Of this we cannot be certain. But now He leaves the eight disciples somewhere in the garden, and, taking Peter and James and John, He was withdrawn from the others about a stone's cast and began to be sorrowful and very heavy, saying unto them, "My soul is exceeding sorrowful even unto death; tarry ye here and watch with Me." Then, leaving the three, He went a little farther and kneeled down and fell on His face on the ground and prayed the prayer of verse 39. Luke says that an angel from heaven appeared to Him and strengthened Him, and, being in an agony, He prayed more earnestly, and His sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground. He came to the disciples and found them asleep and said to Peter, "What, could ye not watch with Me one hour?" Watch and pray (verses 40, 41). He went away the second time and prayed the same prayer. Then He came again to them and found them asleep again and went away the third time and prayed the same words. Then He came the third time to His disciples and said unto them, "Sleep on now and take your rest; behold, the hour is at hand, and the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners." Luke xxii, 45, 46, looks as if when He returned to the eight He found them asleep also and said to them: "Why sleep ye? Rise and pray lest ye enter into temptation." We can read it and write it and meditate upon it, but who can understand it?

### INTERESTING WILL CASE

### Plaintiffs Defeated at Whitby Assizes

Whitby, Nov. 10.—The Corbett will case, which has been before the courts for the past year, was disposed of at the Assizes here this week before Mr. Justice Riddell. The late Jas. Corbett was a rich bachelor, who lived to be over eighty years old. His property was valued at about \$90,000. He left the entire estate to two maiden ladies who lived with him, one his niece, the other his housekeeper. A large number of sisters, nephews and nieces who were not mentioned in the will, sought the aid of the courts to upset the will, which was drawn by the late J. B. Dow, in 1903, six years before Mr. Corbett's death.

The plaintiffs claimed that the late Mr. Corbett had possessed himself of the estate of his father, and had not shared up with his sisters. It was also charged that when the testator made his will he was non compos mentis, that he was afflicted with senile dementia, that the two legatees had acquired great influence over him, that in their hands he was a mere child, and that by undue influence they procured him to make the will for their own benefit, cutting off his relatives; also that he wanted to change his will, but they prevented him doing it, and would not let any of his relatives see him before his death.

On being put on oath none of the plaintiffs could substantiate the allegations made, and the case collapsed before the trial. The plaintiffs' counsel, Mr. R. J. McLaughlin, K.C., Toronto, notified the defendants that he had found no ground to cast blame or imputation or reflection upon either of the legatees, and that they had no knowledge of the will until after Mr. Corbett's death.

The plaintiffs asked that their costs might be paid out of the estate, but his Lordship would not allow it. The executors had agreed to pay their own costs, otherwise the costs of the defence, as well as the court costs, would have had to be borne by plaintiffs.

Noted to Heb. v, 7, "Who in the days of His flesh, when He had offered up prayers and supplications, with strong crying and tears, unto Him that was able to save Him from death and was heard in that He feared." In 1 John v, 15, it is written, "If we know that He hear us whatsoever we ask we know that we have the petitions that we desired of Him." He prayed to Him who was able to save Him from death, and He was heard; therefore He was saved from death in the garden in order that He might finish His work of atonement by dying on the cross for our sins. If these thoughts are wrong may the Lord forgive us for daring to tolerate them, but if they are of Him may He bless them and grant us victory to do His will and perfect submission to it. Now see the agent of the devil daring to kiss our Lord, and behold our Lord submitting to it knowing him to be who and what he was. Simon Peter would have done better without a sword, but how many blunders of his and ours has our blessed Lord remedied! Are we helping people to hear, or are we by inconsistencies hindering them from hearing?
