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"I am Innocent" Cries The Boston Minister

Boston, Mass., Oct. 27. - Thomas Vanland Richeson, the aged father of the Rev. Clarence V. T. Richeson, visited his son in the Charles-st. jail.

The meeting between the aged father and the younger son, who is charged with the murder of the former's tobacco planters and clergyman, caused the aged father to be an affecting one.

Frank H. Carter, with whom Richeson formerly lived in Cambridge and out of the pillars of the Emmanuel Baptist church of which Richeson is pastor, and Douglas Richeson, a brother of the accused preacher, who arrived from Chicago, accompanied the elder Richeson to the prison.

The father was trembling when he walked into the jail, and it was only by bringing to bear that courage that upheld him as a soldier able to walk through the greasy courtyard through the civil war that he was ridder to the grated cell that held his son.

When the father caught sight of the clergyman the agony of his heart was expressed in these words: "My boy - oh, my boy!"

"Father! father!" cried the young man behind the bars. They broke down and cried like children.

After a time the two men regained their composure. A conversation followed the father accused man was overheard to say: "Father, I'm innocent."

The last meeting of Col. Richeson and his son was in the hills of old Virginia. Col. Richeson stood on the doorstep of the homestead at Amherst Court House. One hand was in the clasp of his son, the other placed affectionately on his shoulder.

The young man went away. His grizzled father watched him into the distance. Their lives ran in different channels.

McRae Guilty of Manslaughter

Cornwall, Oct. 27. - The jury sitting on the case of F. D. McRae, charged with having shot and killed William Shaw, dragging the body of the chief constable into the street, returned a verdict of manslaughter this afternoon, after having deliberated nearly two hours.

The prisoner showed no signs of being emotional when the verdict was announced. Judge Sutherland announced that he would pass sentence to-morrow.

Judge Sutherland, in his charge to the jury this afternoon, made a plea for tolerance in matters of religious belief. He stated that the British flag was conceded under the British flag and that in Canada religious feeling should not enter into either private life or public transactions.

He deplored the fact that the religious differences between Dr. C. F. Magee and his wife had been introduced in the trial, but it was done with a view by one of the chief crown witnesses, Dr. Magee, and in that respect he deemed it relevant to the case and had to allow its introduction.
