



OFF GOES QUEUE.

Pekin, Nov. 13 .- The British constitution, with the strictest limitation of the powers of the sovereign, has been adopted by the assembly as the model for China, instead of the Japannese plan, which the Government's commission favored.

Another innovation marking the passing of the old China will be the adoption of the western calendar. Additional concessions wrung

from the throne include the cutting off of the queue, the ancient badge of servile loyalty to Manchu dynasty, as forced by the conquerors; the bandment of the "Eight Banners," the old Manchu military organization, long useless save on the pension rolls; that the Manchus be compelled to adopt Chinese surnames, thus being completely absorbed into Chinese population, and that the pensions paid to all Manchu families be abolished. Since the establishment of the

dynasty every Manchu from birth has drawn a monthly stipend from the Government. Often through fraud this was received by families for members long dead. This pensioning scheme was bitterly resented by the Ch nese and was one of the fundamental causes of anti-


