NEW MANAGER OF THE HOME BANK

Into power he would favor the giving of financial aid by the Dominion to the province in the work of immigration to New Ontario, the construction of permanent highways, the provision and providing practical instruction in agriculture.

Further, under the rule and practice of the Dominion Government before, during and since the completion of the construction of the Ontario Government Railway, the Dominion Parliament appropriated to railways constructed by individuals and companies a bonus or subsidy of \$5,400 per mile, but, although requested more than once to grant a similar subsidy to the Ontario Government Railway, the late Dominion Government steadily refused such request.
