SEAT FOR GRAHAM

The Liberal Association of South Renfrew, adopted a resolution permitting Mr. T. Low, M.P., to resign his seat in favor of Hon. Geo. P. Graham, ex-minister of railways and canals, and instructing the executive to make such arrangements as were necessary to ensure his return by acclamation. This means that Mr. T. W. McGarry, K.O., M.P.P., will be returned by acclamation at the coming provincial elections, providing Hon. Mr. Graham is allowed to go to parliament without opposition.

TUDHOPE DECLINES

Orillia, Ont., Nov. 14.—At the Liberal convention here to-day Mr. J. B. Tudhope, M.P.P., for East Simcoe for a number of terms, definitely announced that he would not again be a candidate. Dr. J. A. Harvie, of Coldwater, was chosen to fill the breach. The new candidate is unknown quantity in politics, his name never having been mentioned in such a connection. Mr. Tudhope also retired from the presidency of the East Simcoe Liberal Association, and Mr. W. H. Manning, of Coldwater, was elected in his stead. Mr. Tudhope's retirement has taken the wind completely out of the Liberal sails, and the convention to-day was poorly attended, and lacked fire and enthusiasm.
