6,345,582 Go to School in India

A statement lately printed in the Gazette of India (the official publication issued by the government from Calcutta) shows that during the year beginning April 1, 1910, and ending March 31, 1911, British India (not including the territories governed by East Indian princes) had a

population of 254,620,616, but only 6,345,582 children in school. Such statistics cannot be characterized as constituting a brilliant record, but the British Government, instead of lamenting over the fact that ignorance stalks the land of India despite a century of British rule, seem disposed to congratulate themselves because of recent years increasing numbers of schoolable boys and girls are receiving instruction. Statistics show, however, that during the last year a million more scholars are to be found in the schools of India than during the previous quinquennium, and that the expenditure on education increased by over \$5,000,000 during that period. But still the facilities for schooling offered by the British Government to East Indian children continues to be very inadequate, since according to the last census four villages out of every five are without

But the most disappointing feature of this educational survey of India is the fact that in the year ending March 31, 1911, the number of girls receiving instruction, according to the Gazette of India, was 193,646. When it is borne in mind that the female population of British India is at least 125,000,008, the fact that less than a million girls are now receiving

Allies Will March in Triumph Into Constantinople

Sofia, Nov. 8.—News of the retreat of the Turkish army on Constantinople is expected hourly.
The feeling in the Bulgarian headquarters favors the Bulgarian army marching into Constantinople accompanied by the Serbian forces operating in Thrace and a Greek force, which will land in the Gulf of Xeros, near the Dardanelles.
The Serbian and Greek crown princes probably will be present, and the cross will be carried in triumph into the mosque of St. Sofia.
Premier Guchoff, in a newspaper interview, says the allies have agreed in a general way on the settlement of territorial questions, but their policy, the liberation of Macedonia, has not been decided in all its details. Common action between the States, he declares, will not cease with the war, and Europe may count upon seeing a most cordial union between the States. The premier says he anticipates no unfriendly action from Roumania. He insists that the allies will submit to no coercion from the powers, but on the contrary would rather fight to the bitter end.
Questioned with reference to the future status of Constantinople and Salonika, M. Guchoff replied that it was impossible to answer until the war had ended. He added that the question of referring territorial and other matters to a European conference must be decided later.
In conclusion, he said that the Balkan States were resolved to follow an equally friendly policy towards both Austria and Russia.

MOTHER AND CHILD KILLED

Hamilton, Tuesday, Nov. 12.—Two deaths were caused by a runaway horse at the Valley Inn, just west of the city, yesterday afternoon. Mrs. S. J. Mitchell, wife of a Flamboro Centre farmer, and her six-year-old daughter, Irene, were the victims. They were driving homeward in a single buggy, and when descending the steep roadway running under the G.T.R. tracks, the horse they were driving took fright at a passing train and dashed madly down the hill. Mrs. Mitchell and her daughter were hurled from the buggy to the roadside, and the little girl was instantly killed. The mother died on the way to the City Hospital.
The horse continued down the hill and ran into the stable at the Valley Inn and the force of the collision knocked a big hole in the side of the building, but the horse and buggy escaped.
A pathetic feature of the unfortunate affair is that the little girl wanted to go to school yesterday morning, but her mother thought the drive to the city would do her good. The horse driven by Mrs. Mitchell was 20 years old and had never run away before.
