The police and banking authorities fear that a huge counterfeiting indus try is located somewhere in Canada, according to an Ottawa despatch, For some months past fraudulent notes have been turning up at benks all over the country, and their circulation seems to be growing. Hundreds of them are being presented in banks in good faith. Most of the fraudulent notes seem to be Dominion ones and twos and Bank of Nova Scotia and Bank of Montreal five dollar notes. Secret service men throughout the Dominion are working hard on the case.
