Working Girls Help Luckless Sisters

One of the most unostentatious but nevertheless worthy philanthropies in Ontario is carried on by the Samaritan Club of Toronto, a small band of ladies who devote their spare hours to relieving the wants of the needy consumptives of the city. At the October meeting of the club it was shown that while most of the city's charitable organizations had

suspended work during the summer, there was a constant need for the efforts of the Samaritan Club, over \$50 having been dispersed in July, August and September. Most of this money was contributed by business girls, one giving \$1 per month, another \$2, while a third gave one-tenth of her income every second month. None of these girls receive large salaries. Such a record should prove an incentive to others who could well afford to give of their means for the benefit of the sick and suffering of the large centres of population.
