He recommended it for well-drained ground; it will not do on low, wet ground. In Hochelaga

Hochelaga went Liberal in 1896 by 606, in 1900 by 635, in 1904 by 598, and in 1908 by 185. Last year Mr. Coderre brought it over to the Conservative column with a majority of 1,978, and this year Sir Wilfrid Laurier failed to enter a candidate. Mr. Doyon, who ran as an independent with Nationalist support, is so badly beaten that he loses his deposit. In a populous constituency, three-fifths French-speaking, all Mr. Lavergne's eloquence and all the fiery outpourings of Mr. Bourassa in Le Devoir availed nothing.
Mr. Coderre took his stand firmly on the Government's policy of immediate emergency aid to the Mother Country, and he got a good majority in every French division, and a vote of 30 to 1 in the English-speaking town of Westmount. Quebec Nationalism is a spent force, and those Canadians, of whatever creed or racial origin, who are not ready to stand by the Empire, as the chief guardian of their liberties, become scarcer every day. The new Imperialism triumphs.

Honor the King and the Flag

It is a sad commentary on our loyalty to read at the foot of a concert program that "the audience is requested to remain standing until the National Anthem is sung." The custom of forgetting our country and our king in a frenzied and wholly unnecessary rush to get out of a public place first is one that unfortunately is on the increase.
