Death of Former Bobcaygeon Man-News Items of Interest

Bobcaygeon, Nov. 25.—The village was pained and surprised Friday morning when the news became known that Mr. W. J. Read, for years a prominent resident of Bobcaygeon, had suddenly died at his home in Saskatchewan the day before. Details at the time were meagre, only that he had been subject lately to weakness of the heart. His body was brought home to-day, his three daughters, Wilhelmina, Greta and Mrs. Croft, and Mr. George Brooks, of Bury's Green accompanying the remains. The funeral will be held to-morrow afternoon from his sister's residence, Mrs. Shepherd, on William-st., and will be in charge of the Masonic order, of which he was a member. Mr. Read was born in Peterboro in 1856, his parents being Wm. B. Read and Maria P. Boekus. When about 5, or as we understand on the day the late King Edward, then the Prince of Wales, visited Peterboro in 1861, his parents moved to Bobcaygeon, where he lived till about five years last October, when he moved west and settled in Saskatchewan, taking up the occupation as station agent for the C. N. R. Mr. Read was identified with various organizations during his life time. He was treasurer of Verulam from his father's death, 20 years ago, till he went west in 1908. He was an enthusiastic curler and was one of the best skips around this part of the country. In fact it has been said that as a skip and curler he ranked in the same class as J. D. Flavelle of Lindsay, who is looked upon as the king pin of Eastern Ontario. Mr. George Brooks, who accompanied the body home, he believes, providentially guided to Mr. Read's home at Rhein, Sask., intending to pay him a friendly call before returning home, but was surprised on arriving at the station, where Mr. Read lived, to be informed on entering the dwelling by Gladys, (Mrs. Croft) that her father had died the night before. Mr. Brooks at once cancelled his arrangements and gave his attention to making ready to accompany the body home. He explains the sudden death as a hemorrhage of the lungs, accompanied by a weak heart. Mr. Read is survived by his wife, three daughters, Wilhelmina, Greta and Gladys, (Mrs. Croft), three sisters, Mrs. Shepherd, of Bobcaygeon, Mrs. McCutcheon, of Cobourg and Miss Emma E. Read, a trained nurse of Buffalo, and one

WEATHER FORECAST.
Last bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross continent Nov. 21 to 25, warm wave 20 to 24, cool wave 23 to 27. This disturbance will bring a great rise in temperatures, a period of unseasonable weather and weather extremes. Most precipitation will continue to be in northern sections of our north-western mountains, in north-eastern sections and about the Gulf of Mexico. Our warnings of severe northern storms to occur first half of November proved fairly good but the storms continued to be severe further east than we anticipated. Next disturbance will reach Pacific Coast about Nov. 26, cross Pacific slope by close of 27, great central valleys 28 to 30, eastern sections Dec. 1. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about Nov. 26, great central valleys 28, eastern sections 30. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about Nov. 29, great central valleys Dec. 1, eastern sections Dec. 3.
