THE REFUGE IS A GOOD PLACE FOR OLD FOLKS

Ex-Warden Bryans Talks of the Impressions Gained While With the Committee Getting Information about Refuge.

Ex-warden Bryans, in the course of conversation on the House of Refuge said:—When I was away on that committee to get information about these places I was impressed with their usefulness. People will tell you that the present way of keeping the poor costs less than the Refuge would. Some less may be spent, but see how the poor are kept. Often a grant of \$3 a month, or perhaps \$5, is given. Now anyone will admit that such a sum cannot keep these people, and yet you are told that the municipality keeps its poor for so much. It does not. Why that would hardly buy the fuel. The fact is that the neighbors after all keep them, and in many cases they actually suffer to an extent of which you have no idea.

If people could see how comfortable the old folks are in the Refugees we visited, I don't think they would want to adhere to the present system. They were cheerful, clean old bodies, many of whom were taking a certain amount of pride in such work as they were able to do about the place. At one Refuge a keen, active old woman, with a slight peculiarity, made all sorts of apologies for the appearance of the kitchen and while hurrying to put things in order eloquently laid the blame for the condition of affairs on Mrs. Somebody whom she regarded as responsible.

At another place was a woman whose husband had died. Shortly after her house and other property were burned. For two or three nights she lay on the roadside. She refused to go to the Refuge, for in her mind it was like the workhouse in the old country, and for most old people who crossed the sea the impression of those places is bad enough. After all, though, this woman was compelled to go, and in a few days took great pleasure in managing the kitchen.

I believe a good many people in Victoria county compare the Refuge to the Old Country workhouse of 50 years ago. That is a mistake. Of course the workhouses there now are very different from what they then were. But the Refuge, as we have it in Canada, is a most comfortable and desirable place for old people to be.

It is a remarkable thing that we did not hear one objection to the Refuge in any place we visited. In many cases we met the entire county council and questioned them closely. Mr. Johnston, especially tried to get some adverse opinion, or criticism of the Refuge, but in no case did we hear one objection.

I think every man who is nominated for county councillor should make himself familiar with the subject and address the electors on nomination day urging upon them the need and benefits of an House of Refuge. Last time there was a popular majority but a minority of divisions in which it carried. Because of opposition from Mariposa, Eldon and Emily, it was not forced through council; but council has the power to build it at anytime and I am convinced that even another such vote as was given before will result in the new councillor's going on with the work. There seems to be an idea outside that this is Lindsay's scheme but surely everybody knows that Lindsay now has a Home that takes care of her indigents. My chief reason for offering for councillor again is that I may support the Refuge movement before and after elections.

The presentation of the Grand Jury of the General Sessions held this week contained a reference to the "munificently generous" offer to build and equip an hospital. It also says:

"With regard to a proposal to establish a House of Refuge in the county, the Grand Jurors are convinced that the time has come for making full provision for the care of the destitute and they express hope that the electors of the county in casting their votes on the question at the ensuing municipal elections will prove unmistakably that they desire the county council to take the necessary steps for providing a properly-equipped institution in which the helpless poor who are to be found in every community may be suitably maintained."
