ANOTHER IMAGINARY DIALOGUE OF THE ONTARIO CABINET

The Prospects of the Liberal Party Again Discussed

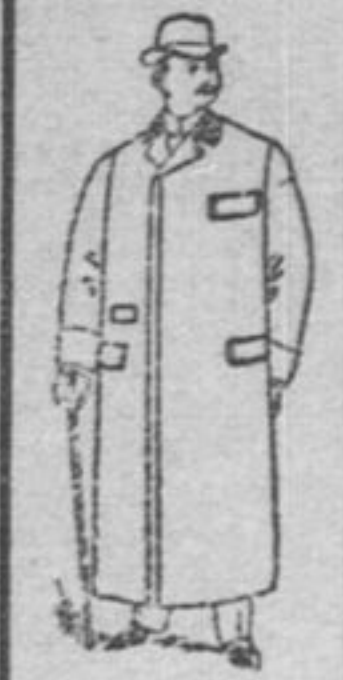

DUNSFORD

The annual meeting of the Star cheese factory, Dunsford, was held on Friday, Nov. 21st, with a large attendance of patrons and others. President, Mr. Alex. Robertson, officiated as chairman. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and confirmed. The treasurer, Mr. Morgan Johns, presented a statement of the receipts and expenditures which was very favorably received. The receipts amounted to \$1500 more than last year. Mr. T. Robertson was re-elected salesman and Mr. Johns treasurer. Mr. Johns has filled this position for over 21 years.

From 1,043,265 lbs milk, supplied by 44 patrons to the factory, 102,628 lbs. of cheese were made, which was sold for the total sum of \$10,225.96. The cost of making was \$1026.28, and the cost of making was \$1026.28. The amount for drawing \$320.47. The amount for envelopes was \$1.25, marked for \$2.45, insurance \$8.40, inspection \$7.50, treasurer \$30, salesman \$22, accountant \$16.50, total \$88.92. The total receipts were \$10,225.96 and the total expenditure \$1936.67, hence the receipts exceeded the expenditure by \$8,289.29, which was divided among the patrons. The lowest price paid per cwt. of milk was 69c, the highest \$1.034. The average price per cwt. was 79.45597 cts. The average season was 10,165 lbs. The average price received per lb. for cheese during the season was 9.954 cts.

Government and Judges

Commenting on the promotion of Justice Armour to the Supreme Court bench the Weekly Sun says that there should be no promotions among judges and adds: But if we are to have promotion on the bench, promotion should be given in order of seniority, unless there are clear reasons to the contrary. In passing over Judge Osler, who was the senior judge of the Court of Appeal, and whose great legal ability is universally recognized, the Government did wrong.

It is well known that owing to Judge Osler's fearless comments at several election trials on the failure of the Ontario Government to punish violations of the election law he incurred the bitter hostility of the powers that be at Ottawa as well as at Toronto. He has now received his punishment. Such occurrences do not establish the independence of the bench or make for the impartial administration of justice.
