BY-LAW NO. 983

A BY-LAW TO RAISE BY LOAN \$40,000 TO PURCHASE ROAD MACHINERY AND MAKE PER-

MANENT IMPROVEMENTS ON THE LEADING STREETS. WHEREAS it is necessary and desirable to raise by way of loan \$40,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing road-making machinery, and making permanent improvements on the leading streets of the Town:

AND WHEREAS for the purpose aforesaid it is necessary to create a debt to the extent of Forty Thousand Dollars and to issue Debentures therefor in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

AND WHEREAS \$2943.28 is the total amount required to be raised annually by special rate for the period of twenty years for paying the said debt and interest thereon at four per cent. per annum, in instalments, according to the terms of this By-law, so that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in each year shall be equal as nearly as may be to what is payable for principal and interest during each of the other years for such period.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Town of Lindsay, according to the last Revised Assessment Roll, is the sum of \$1,934,981.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of existing Debenture Debt of the Town of Lindsay, exclusive of Local Improvement Debts, secured by special acts, rates or assessments, is \$233,953.24 and there is no part of the existing debt in arrear:

THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF LINDSAY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That for the purpose aforesaid it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said Corporation, and he is hereby authorized and required, to cause debentures of the said Town of Lindsay to be made, executed and issued to the amount of Forty Thousand Dollars, in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars, payable in annual instalments on the fifteenth day of December in each year for twenty years, for the following amounts, for principal and interest for the following years respectively, that is to say:

2. That the said Debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, payable on the 15th day of December in each year, and shall have coupons attached for the payment of interest, and the Debentures and Coupons shall be made payable at the office of the Town Treasurer.

3. That there shall be raised and levied in each year for the payment of the said debt and interest, the sum of \$294.28 during the currency of the said debt and debentures by a special rate sufficient therefor on all rateable property in the Municipality of the Town of Lindsay, the same being sufficient to discharge the several yearly sums of principal and interest accruing due as the said sums become respectively payable according to the terms of this By-law.

4. That the said Debentures shall be issued all at one time and may be issued at any time within two years after the passing of this By-law.

5. There shall be a Board of five Commissioners for the expenditure of said moneys, to be known as Road Commissioners, who shall act without salary or pay, the said Board to be composed of the Mayor and the Chairman of the Board of Works for the time being, and three Commissioners to be elected in accordance with By-law No. 982.

6. That the proceeds of the said debenture shall be expended by the said Board of Commissioners for the purpose of purchasing road machinery and in making permanent improvements on the leading streets of the Town, and for no other purpose whatsoever, the same to be expended as far as practicable and advisable upon the plan of street improvement recommended by Road Commissioner Campbell.

7. That the said Road Commissioners shall be at liberty to call upon any of the Town officials to assist them in the expenditure of the said moneys, and the town officials when so requested shall assist the Road Commissioners in the expenditure of the same in the same manner as if the moneys were being expended by the Council, and the officials so assisting shall not be entitled to or allowed any additional remuneration that he would not be entitled to if the same were being expended by the Council.

8. That the vote of all the electors in the Town of Lindsay entitled to vote thereon shall be taken on this By-law on.....

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TWICE TOLD TALES

News of the World Condensed Into Brief Paragraphs

—Alfred Peat, a New York wall paper king, whose business has increased at the rate of a million dollars a year, has been committed to an insanity asylum.

—There are some good points about despotic government after all. The Russian minister of the interior has just sentenced eighteen lawyers to jail for a year.

—Mrs. Harry Ackerhausen, wife of a Philadelphia liquor dealer, at 2835 Ridge-ave., is critically ill from eating candy containing small pins and narcotics, which she received, neatly boxed, through the mails.

—It is almost needless to mention that the Chicago professor who says a man can live comfortably and keep a family on \$300 a year, doesn't have to make the experiment.

—Charles V. Herleski, American consul at Callao, Peru, spoke disapprovingly of King Edward at a paragoning of King Edward at a British club in Callao and although he escaped being mobbed he was asked to resign by the State Department at Washington.

—We understand that you can buy this Welsh coal with Canadian money—if you have it.

—Verestchagin, the Russian military artist, at a public auction of his paintings in New York on Wednesday night, received \$18,000 for his picture of the San Juan Hill charge, showing Col. Roosevelt charging at the head of his troops, and the 20 pictures depicting Napoleon's disastrous Russian campaign were reserved for the Czar, who, rumor says, will pay \$100,000 for the 20 canvases.

—A British baronet is suing his wife for divorce because she kicked him on the shins. The opposing lawyer argues that the plaintiff hasn't a leg to stand on.

—The Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York announced on Wednesday to the clerical force at the home office that they would insure the life of each employe for \$1,000 and keep the policy in force so long as he remains in the employe of the society, one-half the amount of the insurance to be paid at the employe's death to his wife or family or any designated beneficiary, the other half to go into a fund to be used by the officers for pensions, or in other ways to provide for needy living employes.

—Two negro women and one negro man were sold by the sheriff to the highest bidder before the courthouse, at Lancaster, Kentucky, on Friday, one for three months, the other two for two and three years respectively. They were convicted for vagrancy in the circuit court.

—Deer are reported as getting scarcer in the north woods which will make it necessary for more people to look like them in order to provide amateur gunners with their proper allowance of sport.

—The natural defence of the chap charged with making his wife sleep in the coal bin would have been the simple statement that the coal bin was the proper place for his dearest possession.

—During the trial of 925 peasants at Karkoff, Russia, on a charge of rebellion, the 18 lawyers defending the prisoners left the court room, declaring that the trial of the condemned was a farce, and the condemnation of the peasants a forgone conclusion. The Minister of the Interior punished the lawyers by condemning them to one year's solitary confinement, on a bread-and-water diet, for their demonstrations against the Government.

—A violent eruption of the volcano La Soufriere in St. Vincent Island the fifth big outburst since the catastrophe of May 7, took place last week. Georgetown and the village of Chateau Bellair, situated on the west coast of St. Vincent, were again evacuated by their inhabitants. Telephonic communication in those districts is interrupted, owing to fierce lightning. Subterranean rumblings can be heard and volcanic clouds are seen from Kingstown. The crater had been smoking constantly since the terrible eruption of Oct. 16.

—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is at Hot Springs, Virginia for his health. His doctors say he has no organic disease and needs only rest and quiet.

—A despatch from Atehin, Sumatra announces that Lieut Dekok and forty-five troops on board a barge on a river in the interior were recently attacked by a band of Achines with the result that the barge sank and the Lieutenant and twenty men were drowned. This war has been going on since 1871.

—Britain's decision to grow cotton in South Africa is probably inspired by the circumstance that wool flourishes on the very heads of the natives.

—The freight steamer Sylvannus J. Macy sank off Port Burwell, Lake Erie, in a furious gale on Sunday the 23rd of November. She went down suddenly and the crew was lost.

—It is announced that the 5th Royal Garrison Regiment at Halifax has its full quota of officers, whereas we know other regiments in the slightly different predicament of having their quota of full officers.

—Erasmus Williams a switchman at Chatham was run over on Thursday of last week. He died in half an hour. It is not clearly known how the accident occurred. The yard engine was backing with several cars, when the body of Williams was noticed dragging beside the rail, one pair of tracks having passed over him. The car was derailed by the body.

—They talk of starting a distillery in Toronto to use up beet sugar factory refuse—hogs eat some and human beings consume the rest.
