### THE LIBRARY BY.LAW

We are not so enthusiastic over the benefits of the Public Library as some; nor do we believe that it is advisable for a town like Llndsay, to, at the present time, spend or engage to spend large rums upon a library. At the risk of being regarded as barbarian by some people, we are free to say that roads are of far more importance to this town at present than a library, and that if the \$1000 now put into the library every year, were spent, instead on the streets, it would be a good thing for the town. The amount of money now being spent on education in Lindsay is out of proportion to that spent on material improvements, which, after all, must be the foundation of all intellectual advance; for if these are not looked after, not the town's intelligence alone, but the town itself must disappear. There is no use in being so idealistic and refined as to overlook the physical and commercial basis of culture.

However, a proposition is now before the town with regard to a new public library building that cannot be ignored. - It forces the question of further expense for library purposes upon us. It does it permaturely, but nevertheless does it, and in such a form as to involve the acceptance or rejection of \$10,000 in cash. The thing to be done now is the best thing. In the future no doubt the library now offered the town will be great advantage to it. Likely the town will not feel much better able to build a lidrary than it does now; for other expenses will have grown by then. Hence, it seems altogether desirable to get the \$1000 now offered us.

To do that, a site for the building must be got. It seems that to give a part of the town property would result in legal difficulties that might easily cost as much as a purchased site. It is proposed to buy a site, say the Wilson corner, and a by-law for \$2,000 to do so is to be submitted in January. The site is a good one and to buy it for that sum seems about the simplest and best way of securing Mr. Carnegie's \$10,000. On these grounds we favor the by-law.




