The Weather December. Prof. Irl Hicks in Word and Works for December, says the first four days of the month will be stormy, but mild and cloudy. A series of storms marks the month; before these the weather will be mild, and after them decidedly cold. After the 4th a cold wave comes; then about the 7th or 8th south winds will bring rain and possibly thunder. The rain turns to snow soon and a wide cold wave arrives about the 9th and extends to the 12th at least. Heavy storms of wind and snow with cold will visit the north and Atlantic coasts about the 14th, and blizzards will mark that and following day or two all through the north and west. Blustering weather will prevail till about the 19th, when rain and probably thunder will occur, but a severe cold wave sets in. People are warned against being deceived by a "beautiful day" now and then. Close on it comes the storm and right after that the cold. That rotation is to be the order of the month.
