

THE PURPOSE OF A PUBLIC LIBRARY.

WHEREAS a By-law of the Municipal Council of the Town of Lindsay was passed on the Ninth day of January, A. D. 1899, establishing a Public Library in this Municipality under the Public Libraries Act; AND WHEREAS a sum of Two

Thousand Dollars is required for the purpose of purchasing a site for the erection of a building for the said Public Library as appears by the special estimate for that purpose furnished by the Lindsay Public Library Board to the Council;

AND WHEREAS for the purpose aforesaid it is necessary to create a debt to the extent of Two Thousand Dollars and to issue Debentures therefor in the manner herinafter mentioned:

AND WHEREAS it will require the sum of \$147.17 annually for a period of twenty years for the payment, of the debt created by this By-law, with interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum, in instalments according to the terms of this By-law, so that the aggregate amount payable for the principal and interest in each year shall be equal as nearly as may be to what is payable for principal and interest during each of the other years for such period, and it is desirable to have the debentures to be therefor payable in twenty annual instalments or block sums of \$147.17 and so drawn as to include the principal and interest at four per cent. per annum as hereinafter set out, instead of detentures with coupons.

AND WHEREAS the said annual sum of \$147.17 with a reasonable amount for annual expenses or maintaining and managing the said Public Library, will exceed half a mill in the dollar upon the assessed value of all rateable real and personal property in the Town of Lindsay, and involve an assessment exceeding the amount specified in sub-section one of section 14 of the Public Libraries Act, and it is necessary that the said annual sum shall in each year during the said period of twenty years be raised by special rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable property in the Town af Lindsay, the same being the total amount required for that


