# THE TOWN IS ABOUT READY TO CANCEL THE GAS CONTRACT

Alderman Have at Last Got Tired of the Company's Methods and Light

## CHALMERS STILL STAYS

Council Wants Him to Hold His Position Till the Year's End - Resignation Takes Effect Then

The street-lighting problem that has so exercised the town for the past two years is again approaching a crisis. On Monday night council talked strongly of the Gas Company's light and the methods employed by them and practically declared that the time was at hand to take steps to cancel the contract, because the company had not lived up to its terms. With this in view, the town solicitor was instructed to notify the company of this contemplated step and to attend a meeting on Monday night at which the contract will be under discussion.

A PRIVATE TEST Some time ago Mr. Burgess told council that he would be in town on a certain night with the government expert and make a test of the street light, and asked that representative citizens witness it. On that night Ald. McDiarmid, chairman of the Police and Lighting Committee met Mr. Burgess and the expert at the station but only to be told that only a private test was to be made. Since then nothing further has been heard from Mr. Burgess, but attached to the company's bill for November was a certificate from a Mr. J. K. Johnson of Toronto, government gas inspector, saying that the small lamps were of the candle power required.

At Monday night's meeting of the committee Ald. McDiarmid explained that the accounts for October and November had not yet been paid there was no proof that the light actually given on the street was up to the required candle power.
