THREE GREAT CANYONS.

Yosemite, Yellowstone and Grand Canyon of the Colorado Compared.
The justly famous Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone is, like the Colorado, gorgeously colored and abruptly countenanced in a plateau, and both are mainly the work of water. But the Colorado's canyon is more than 1,000 times larger, and as a score or two new buildings of ordinary size would not appreciably change the general view of a great city so hundreds of Yellowstones might be eroded in the sides of the Colorado canyon without noticeably augmenting its size or the richness of its sculpture. But it is not true that the great Yosemite rocks would be thus lost or hidden. Nothing of their kind in the world, so far as I know, rivals El Capitan and Tissiack, much less El Capitan or in any way belittles them. None of the sandstone or limestone precipices of the canyon that I have seen or heard of approaches in smooth, flawless strength and grandeur the granite face of El Capitan or the Tenaya side of Cloud's Rest. These colossal cliffs, types of permanence, are about 3,000 and 6,000 feet high; those of the canyon that are sheer are about half as high and are types of fleeting change, while glorious domes Tissiack, noblest of mountain buildings, far from being overshadowed or lost in this rosy, spiry canyon company, would draw every eye and in serene majesty "aboon them a" she would take her place—castle, temple, palace or tower. Nevertheless a noted writer, comparing the Grand Canyon in a general way with the glacial Yosemite, says: "And the Yosemite—ah, the lovely Yosemite! Dumped down into the wilderness of gorges and mountains, it would take a guide who knew of its existence a long time to find it." This is striking and shows up well above the levels of commonplace description, but it is confusing and has the fatal fault of not being true.—John Muir in Century.

Obituary
MRS. A. LAWDER
This town lost one of its oldest and most respected citizens when Mrs. A. A. Lawder died two weeks ago. Mrs. Lawder was born in 1820. She was the daughter of Rev. A. S. Clarke, rector of Enniskillen, Ireland, and sister of Rev. R. J. Clarke, London and aunt of Inspector Dunford of the Irish Constabulary.
With her husband deceased came to Canada as pioneers in the province. They came to Lindsay many years ago, but Mrs. Lawder had been long a widow. Their only daughter was the late Mrs. (Dr.) Kenny, town. Two sons, Mr. A. Lawder of Chicago, and Mr. Jas. Lawder, town, survive.

MR. WM. PASSMORE
A British navy veteran and an interesting citizen of this town was removed by the death of Mr. W. Passmore on the 16th inst. Mr. Passmore had been for 14 years janitor of the Collegiate Institute, and among his sincerest mourners are students of that institution.
Deceased was born in Great Torrington, Eng., in 1838. When 17 years old he entered the navy as a middy on H.M.S. President. After 20 years he got an honorable discharge and life pension. He came to Canada in 1882 and to Lindsay four years later. In 1887 he was on board H. M. S. Aurora on Lake Ontario, helping to repel the Fenian Raid.
In 1867 he married Miss M. A. Elliott who with four daughters survive him. They are Mrs. R. A. Playfair, Mrs. H. J. Little and Miss Ethel Passmore, town, and Miss M. Passmore of London, Eng.
Mr. Passmore was an enthusiastic cricketer and curler, a member of the Victoria Rifle Association. He had been in poor health for two years and gradually lost strength through the inroads of dropsy and heart trouble. The funeral on Thursday of last week was largely attended. The Collegiate cadets mustered in the procession, with reversed arms.
