Mosemite, Yellowstone and Grand Canyon of the Colorado Compared. The justly famous Grand Canyon of The Yellowstone is, like the Colorado, gergeously colored and abruptly countersunk in a plateau, and both are mainly the work of water. But the Colorado's canyon is more than 1,000 times larger, and as a score or two new buildings of ordinary size would not appreciably change the general view of a great city so hundreds of Yellowstones might be eroded in the sides of the Colorado canyon without noticeably augmenting its size or the richness of its sculpture.
