

The Steele Briggs Seed Co. quote red clover, clean and free from weeds at \$6.75 to \$7; No. 2, containing a slight sprinkling of rib, gradd, \$6.75; seed containing a large percentage of weeds they quote at 5c a lb. to \$5.40 per bushel. In alsike they quote No. 1 at \$6.25 to \$6.50, and fancy lots a little higher; No. 2 they quote at \$5.10 to \$5.65; 3, \$4.35 to \$4.65, and say that low grade seeds, containing weeds, difficult to market at any price. Timothy they report unchanged.

Mr. Ross Speaks on Comparative Pol tics-Framers of B. N. A. Act Drew Inspiration From Washington. The merits of the British constitu

tion as manifested in the British North America Act and the sharper points of tion of the United States were forcibly clarified by Hon. Geo. W. Ross, LL.D. before the McMaster University Lite. ary Society in Toronto recently. Speaking upon the theme, "A Perspective of Canadian History," Mr Ross treated his subject with the utmost lucidity and presented a veritable compendium of the comparative politics of the greatest nations of the world. Commenting upon the importance of

studying Canadian history, as any other, in its proper setting, and evolving the processes by which it obtained its liberty and laws, Mr. Ross outlined the background of Canadian history, Briefly, this consisted in French influence with a British over-coloring, the former present to-day and for all time to come. Perfect liberty for both inter ests had come only by installments. The Quebec Act, the constitutional act, the act of union-each had been a progression in enlarging, and deepening love for British institutions. No constitution, said Mr. Ross, was

an original document. The British North America Act had a strong raison d'etre. That stumbling-block, equal French and English representation in Parliament, political incompatibility of Upper and Lower Canada, and the urgency of solidarity to the north of the American boundary line - all of these dictated its framing. A Complete Constitution.

But how much of this act had been borrowed? Its constitution was far from original. In the first place, it was composite. In preamble it proposed to create a Federal union of pro-
