

A By-law to raise by way of loan the sum of \$10,000 to construct Steel or Cement Bridges in the Township of Mariposa.

WHEREAS it is necessary and desirable to construct permanent Bridges of steel or cement in the township of Mariposa to replace the present wooden bridges and it is desirable to raise the sum of ten thousand dollars for that purpose...

AND WHEREAS, for the purpose aforesaid it is necessary to create a debt to the extent of \$10,000, and to issue debentures therefor in manner hereinafter mentioned.

AND WHEREAS, \$735.82 is the total amount required to be raised annually by special rate for a period of twenty years for paying the said debt and interest thereon at four per cent. per annum in instalments according to the terms of this By-law...

AND WHEREAS, the amount of the whole rateable property of the township of Mariposa, according to the last revised assessment roll is the sum of \$296,098, being made up as follows: \$296,020 in real estate, \$12,787 in business assessment and \$12,091 in income assessment.

AND WHEREAS, the amount of the existing Debenture Debt of the township of Mariposa is \$109,424.44 being wholly made up of local improvement debts secured by special by-law rates or assessments, and there is no part of the principal or interest of the said existing debt in arrears.

THEREFORE, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Mariposa, enacts as follows:

1. That for the purpose aforesaid it shall be lawful for the Reeve and Treasurer of the said Corporation, and they are hereby authorized, and required to cause debentures of the said Township of Mariposa to be made, executed and issued to the amount of \$10,000 in sums of not less than one hundred dollars payable in annual instalments on the tenth day of December in each year for twenty years...

2. That the said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, payable on the 10th day of December in each year, and shall have coupons attached for the payment of interest, and the debentures and coupons shall be made payable at the Ontario Bank, Lindsay.

3. There shall be raised and levied in each year for the payment of said debt and interest, and the debentures issued thereon, the sum of \$735.82 during the currency of the said debt and debentures by a special rate sufficient therefor on all rateable property in the municipality of the Township of Mariposa...

4. That the proceeds of the said debentures shall be paid and applied for the purposes and with the objects above recited and for no other purpose whatsoever.

5. That the said debentures shall be issued all at one time, and may be issued at any time within two years after the passing of this By-law.

6. That the votes of all the electors in the municipality of Mariposa, entitled to vote thereon shall be taken on this by-law on the same day as the next annual election for the Municipal Council of the Township of Mariposa, on the first day of January, A.D., 1906, and that the polls will be held at the same hour on the same day at the same places, and by the same deputy returning officers as for the said Municipal elections.

7. That on the 20th day of December, A.D., 1905 at the Clerk's office in the Village of Oakwood, at two o'clock in the afternoon is hereby fixed as the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend the various polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk respectively on behalf of persons interested in the promoting or opposing of this By-law respectively.

8. That on the second day of January, A.D., 1906, at the Clerk's office in the township of Mariposa, at twelve o'clock, noon, is hereby fixed as the time and place where the clerk of this council shall sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law respectively.

TAKE NOTICE that the above is a true copy of a proposed By-law which has been taken into consideration and which will be finally passed by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Mariposa in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereto, after one month from the 15th day of December, 1905, being the date of the first publication thereof in the Watchman-Wardner newspaper and that the polls for taking the votes of the electors thereon will be held at the hour, day and places named in the said by-law.

London, Dec. 19.—Cattle are quoted at 10s to 12s per lb.; refrigerated, 9c to 9 1/2c per lb. Sheep, 10 1/2c to 12c.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK.

Receipts of live stock at the city market since last Friday, as reported by the rail-ways, were 62 car loads, 1270 cattle, 1650 sheep, 1470 hogs and 60 calves.

Prices ranged from \$3.30 to \$4.00 for export steers and \$3.50 to \$4.25 per cwt. for export bulls.

Butchers. A few choice picked butcher cattle sold around \$4 per cwt.; and a lot of 5 was sold at \$4.50; medium cattle sold at about \$3.75; common at \$3.25 to \$3.50; inferior and rough at \$2.50 to \$3 and canners at \$1.25 to \$2.25 and \$2.50 per cwt.

Feeders and Stockers. Prices for stockers and feeders remained about steady at following quotations: Best feeders, 1000 to 1150 lbs. each, at \$3.40 to \$3.80 per cwt.; medium feeders, 1000 to 1150 lbs., at \$3.25 to \$3.65; feeders, 550 to 1000 lbs., at \$3.15 to \$3.50; best stockers, 900 to 1000 lbs., at \$2.90 to \$3.15; common light stockers, at \$2.50 to \$2.75; stock buyers, at \$2.25 to \$2.75.

Milk Cows. The market for milk cows and springers was much slower than for some time. About 20 sold all the way from \$2.50 to \$50 each.

Veal Calves. About 60 veal calves were sold at \$3.50 to \$6 per cwt. The market is strong for calves of good choice quality.

Sheep and Lambs. Deliveries of sheep and lambs were fairly large. Export ewes, \$4 to \$4.30; bucks and culs at \$3 to \$3.25 per cwt.; lambs sold at \$5.50 to \$6.25 per cwt. for picked ewes and wethers; bucks, \$5.50 to \$5.75 per cwt.

Hogs. Mr. Harris got all offered on the market, at a decline of 30c per cwt. or selects at \$5.15 and lights and fats at \$5.25; sows, \$5 per cwt; stags, \$2.50 to \$3.50 per cwt. These quotations are for fed and watered.

Berlin, Dec. 20.—The German Government has directed its Minister at Petrograd to express to the Brazilian Government its regret that the officers and men of the cruiser Panther sent ashore at Itajahy to obtain, unobtrusively, facts concerning a supposed deserter from the Panther, over-stepped the proper forms.

Winnipeg, Dec. 20.—Bishop Stringer, Bishop of Selkirk, left for the east Monday night to spend the winter months. His first destination will be his former home in Kincardine, Ont. He will probably return to the west late in February or early in March.

Scotch Stallions For Guelph.

St. John, N. B., Dec. 20.—The Donaldson line Tritonia arrived yesterday from Glasgow, with 29 horses for breeding purposes, consigned to Oswald Sory of Guelph, Ont., and John A. Turner of Calgary. Twenty-five are Clydesdale stallions.

The Tatler Released.

Ottawa, Dec. 20.—The American vessel, The Tatler, seized at Sydney, was released, having taken out a license.

Descendant of Lord Nelson.

At the Trafalgar celebration held in Brockville, it was stated that Mr. W. S. Buell, ex-Mayor of Brockville and son of the late Lieut.-Col. Buell, who represented Brockville in the Dominion House during the Mackenzie regime, is a lineal descendant of Lord Nelson. His aunt, Miss Senkler, residing in Brockville, has in her possession a cuff link given by Lord Nelson to his chaplain. This chaplain was the great-grandfather of Mr. Buell and a first cousin of Lord Nelson.

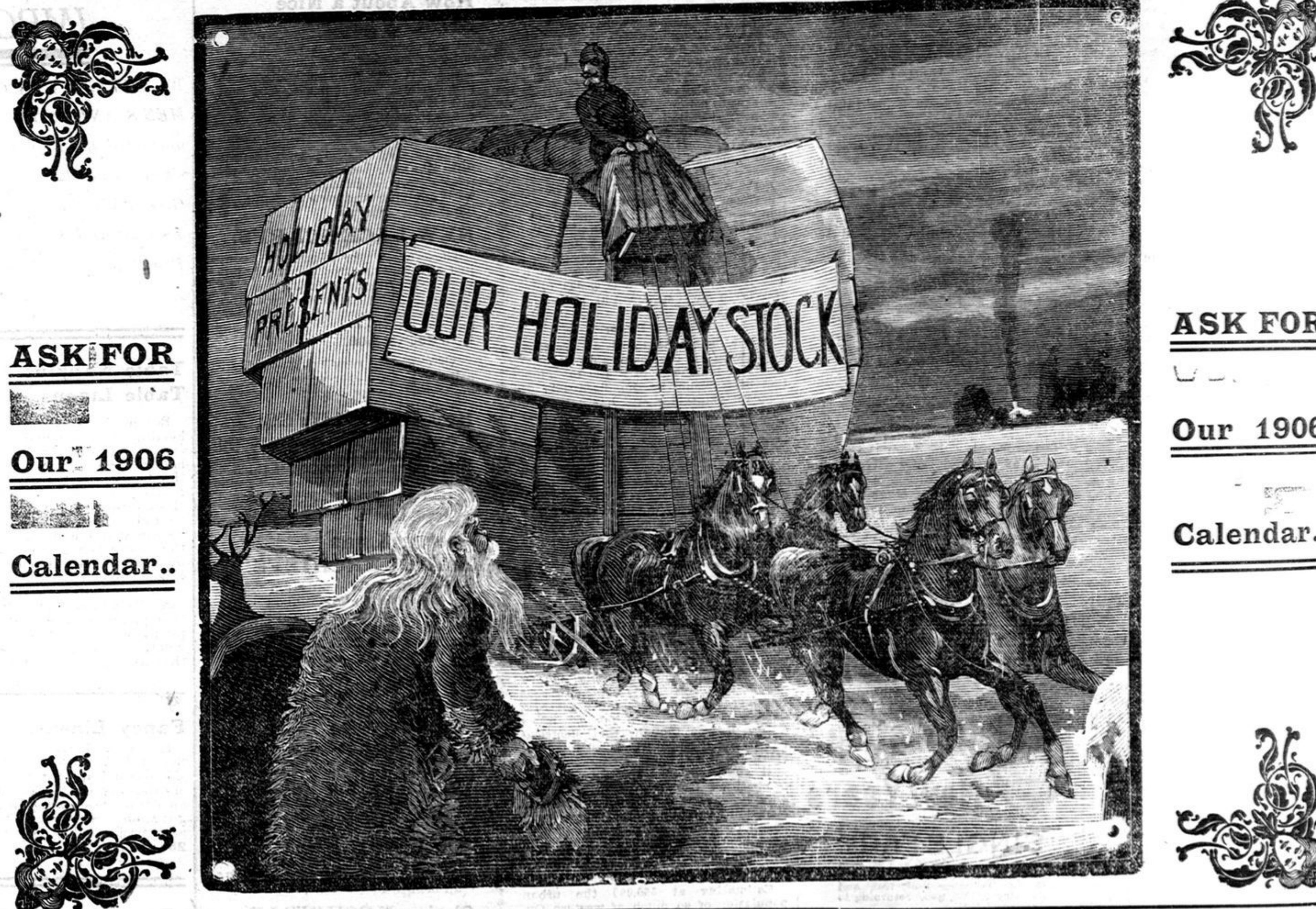
